The Leafs, driving to within three games of the fourth place Red Wings, played without four of their forwards and one defence-man.

Syl Apps and Ted Kennedy were out of uniform with injuries. Nick Metz was absent because of the death of his father and Dave Schirner, Lorne Carr and Doug Baldwin sat through the entire contest without leaving the bench. Stewart, running his goal out-put to 23 for the season, scored twice within eight minutes of the first period and easily was the fastest man on the ice, twice getting away for solo sprints in the final period only to have his shots stopped by goalie Harry Lumley.
