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ANOTHER INSTANCE OF GERMAN BRUTALITY

(Exclusive to the Guardian) PARIS, September 5.—By C. F. Bertell, Special correspondent of the International Service: A Belgian lady arriving destitute today with a sick little daughter told me, "My husband, my mother, and ourselves were at our country house near France on the Belgian frontier when eight German soldiers came and ordered my husband to give them dinner. He refused and was shot. My mother was also shot. I was stripped and attached with ropes to the banister in the hall. Then eight brutes caught my eleven year old daughter and all of them have held unshakably under my very eyes my daughter has since lost her reason. I just want to die."

ALLIES REFITTING DURING FIVE QUIET DAYS

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, Sept. 6.—The official information bureau public today a summary of situation in France. It says that five quiet days, since the action of Sept. 1, have been occupied by the British with refitting and consolidation of units. The British army is now south of the Marne and in line with the French on the right and left. The French army, it is said, defeated three German army corps, driving them back in disorder near Guise on Aug. 29.
