APRIL 21.
JESUS APPEARS TO THE APOSTLES.
John 20, 19-20. Memory verses, 19, 20.
GOLDEN TEXT.

Blessed are they that have not seen, and yet have believed.—John 20, 29.

OUTLINE.

1. Jesus and the Ten, v. 19-23.
 2. Jesus and Thomas, v. 24-29.
- Time.—A. D. 30, probably Sunday, April 9, and on the evening of the day one week afterward, April 16.
- Place.—Jerusalem.

LESSON HELPS.

19. "The first day of the week"—The day after the Jewish Sabbath, which soon began to be observed as a sacred day because the Lord then arose from the dead.

"For fear of the Jews"—Persecution followed the scenes of the crucifixion and the flock of disciples without a shepherd was scattered. They remembered that Jesus told them that they would suffer persecution, and their fears were aroused "Came Jesus"—To comfort them, as his salvation shows.

20. "Then were the disciples glad"—They had cause to be, for here was one, a victor over death, and through him they too would victors be.

21. "Peace be unto you"—A great blessing was here bestowed. It was peace—that peace which comes from the pardon of sin, and which leads to such a trust in God that it removes the fear of earthly foes. This peace is like a river pure and bright and moving with a steady flow. "So send I you"—The disciples were to be as their Master, and as he trod the path of sorrow and of persecution so must they. They were to go forth by divine command, and before them was not only death, but the crown of endless life.

22. "Receive ye the Holy Ghost"—What was given was the presence of a divine person, On the day of Pentecost he appeared more clearly and with greater results, as was foretold by Jesus. His presence now was light in the darkness.

23. "Ye remit, they are remitted"—Those who are sent by Christ and receive the Holy Ghost have power by preaching the truth of Christ to pardon though the truth and those who reject the truth and then turn from the messengers of it, find thereby that their sins are not pardoned but retained.

24. "But Thomas . . . was not with them when Jesus came"—Why he was not we do not know. He was by nature a doubter and, in fact his doubt was not a matter for wonder. It is a mistake to think harshly of him for Jesus did not, but gave him the desired evidence. His strong doubts which were so fully met confirm our faith in the resurrection.

27. Reach hither. . . and be not faithless but believing—"Jesus was willing to give the proof demanded, and place some honour on the honest doubter. He knew that when doubt was dispelled strong conviction of truth would take its place.

29. "My Lord and my God"—Thomas had not been an infidel, but a doubter; and the doubt sprang from his nature, which was not hopeful of the fact that Jesus had risen. When his doubt was removed, his faith leaped up and he saw in Jesus the risen One, the Lord of Glory.

29. "Thou hast seen"—Blessed are they that have not seen"—A blessing which comes from the testimony of sight, and that is well; but their is a far greater blessing which comes from the testimony of eye-witnesses, and with such faith God is well pleased. The triumph of faith let us have and enjoy.

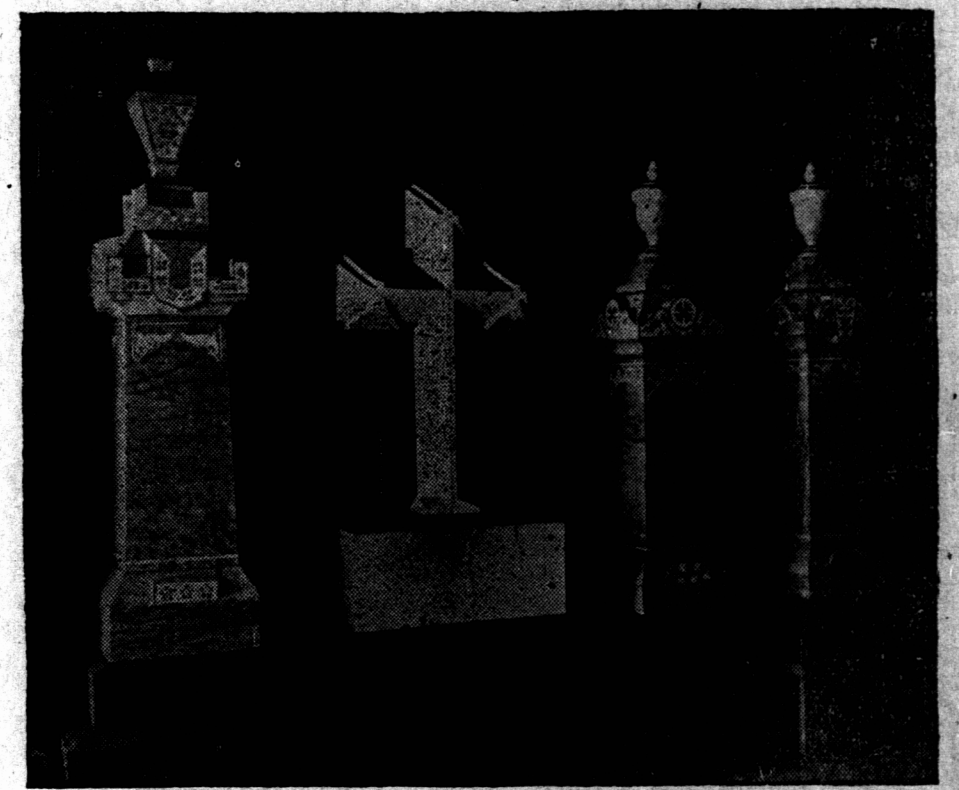
