Teachers Convention

The local teacher's convention was held at Tignish, September 5th. There were about forty teachers in attendance.

The convention was opened by an encouraging address by the President, Mr. John Gillis. The highest aim any teacher could have is to become a successful teacher. This could only be accomplished by continued hard labor and the co-operation of parents and pupils. We must all remember that it is human nature on which teachers have to work and they should govern themselves accordingly.

Mr. H. H. Shaw next addressed the teachers. He stressed the subject English a great deal. He urged every teacher, with the help of the Librarian to read as much as they could read about the different subjects they teach especially history and geography. He explained briefly the course of studies and the reasons for the changes in same.

Mr. Wm. J. Handrahan read a paper on "Teaching Geography."

At the opening of the afternoon session Miss Gillis gave a very interesting talk on teaching and learning. A prerequisite in teaching was a full knowledge of what we are to teach; then we should have an appealing way of presenting it to the pupils.

Then Mr. Gallant spoke to the teachers. He pointed out some reasons why some teachers do not make a success of their profession. There was a lack of knowledge and a lack of energy on the part of the teachers, and inattentiveness on the part of pupils. The teacher should strive to keep the child's attention on what they are being taught and to this end teacher's should be careful of the time and manner in which they teach the different subjects.

Miss Buote read a very practical paper on Physical Drill.

Miss MacLean, Junior Red Cross supervisor spoke to the teachers on the work that was being done by the society for handicapped children. She asked the co-operation of the teacher's as their help was a big factor in the success of the society.

Rev. J. A. MacDonald gave a very instructive talk. His interest in the subject is greatly appreciated. He asked the teacher's to lighten the burden of the parents by permitting the use of the old books if the new books prescribed could not be obtained, due to the depression. This proposal was favourably met by the teachers.

Miss Bertha O'Brien also addressed the teachers.

The officers for the coming year are: Mr. John Gillis, President; Mr. Wm. J. Handrahan, Vice-President; Miss Bertha Doyle, Secretary.

Resolutions of thanks was tendered to Rev. J. A. MacDonald and Tignish High School teachers for the use of their building and to all those who helped with the success of the convention.

A Resolution was also passed that teacher's be paid their salaries according to their class irrespective of supplement, voted or collected.

Mr. Bramwell Chandler was also present at the forenoon session and speaking on behalf of the Carnegie Libraries, said that a book per school could now be procured for as long as three months.

16 Year Old Girl Claims To Be Scots Clan Chief

LONDON, Sept. 10—Members of a Scottish clan are split over the question: Shall a woman be our chieftain? Five years ago Colonel Alexander Hew MacLean, chieftain of the MacLeans of Ardgour, Argyllshire, died leaving no male heir.

He was said to have been the best-loved chieftain in the Highlands. He willed his estate of Ardgour to his eldest daughter, Catriona.

Catriona will be sixteen this month. Her mother, the Hon. Mrs. MacLean, assumed that Catriona, as her father's eldest daughter, would be chieftain of the MacLeans of Ardgour.

The Clan Association disagreed. They claimed that a female could be chieftain of the clan only when there was no suitable male heir in the direct line of succession.

Accordingly, some months ago the Clan Association welcomed Commander H. H. MacLean, of Bursledon, Hampshire, as chieftain of the MacLeans of Ardgour.

The Hon. Mrs. MacLean strongly opposed this move. Other influential members of the clan support the right of Miss Catriona MacLean.

Miss Catriona said to a newspaper representative recently: "I want to be a chieftain of the MacLeans of Ardgour as my father was."

"Commander H. H. MacLean is an Englishman, and he has no property whatever in Scotland."

"I, on the other hand, am the direct successor to my father's title, and I am heir to the estates of Ardgour."

"I see no reason why I should be passed over in favor of a man who is my father's second cousin. There have been plenty of examples of girls being accepted as chieftains of Scottish clans, and my mother and I are determined to fight any attempt to pass me over."

Airplanes Bring Civilization To Golden New Guinea

Hostile Natives Stand in Path of Daring Prospectors as Rich Fields Are Opened Up

For centuries, New Guinea, the largest but one of the cluster of fascinating islands that once formed a solid link between Australia and Asia, has been a No-Man's Land, insofar that the greater part of it was unknown.

Even now a very large part of it is still a blank on the map, and many people here the vaguest idea of its location. Part of New Guinea is administered under League of Nations mandate by the Australian Commonwealth Government, and another part, Papua, is Australian territory.

Much of it is impenetrable jungle and formidable mountain and ravine, albeit of great beauty. Land communication between any two given points is a tedious, unrelenting, and often unreliable journey. The natives make journeys into the interior hazardous, if not impossible.

New Guinea has always attracted explorers. The fascination of the unknown and the hunt of mineral wealth has lured intrepid men to penetrate its jungles, often to die at the hands of natives. Nobody, until about eight years ago, had succeeded in getting more than thirty miles away from the coast, and across the island. The airplane, like the hinterland, was unknown then.

Then, suddenly, reports filtered through to Australia that some adventurous prospectors had succeeded in making their way up country to an area now known as Edie Creek, about thirty miles in a direct line from the coast, but actually a two weeks' hazardous journey. There, it was said, they had found gold.

Other prospectors tried to follow suit, but the place was too inaccessible, and transport of supplies so difficult, and the natives so treacherous, that they were officially warned off.

But gold was there, and gold is an irresistible magnet. It was only a few months before the first airplane made its appearance in the search for the new Eldorado. Within a year aviation had opened up the Edie Creek goldfield.

14 Days' Trek in Half an Hour

The first flight from the coast of Wau, now the flourishing center of the field, was made in April, 1927. It took half an hour, compared with 12 or 14 days on foot. A rough landing field was made, unique in that it was of necessity on a slope, and that the machine had to alight uphill and take off downhill, irrespective of wind direction. Today, there are 21 airfields, and landing fields in Australian New Guinea. There are five air companies, owning 25 airplanes, and the rough camp where the handful of original prospectors lived precariously has become a civilized township of a thousand or more people, with its own shops, hospital, electric light, and wireless telephone.

Behind the vanguard of prospectors and patrol officers are the missionaries, who are equally welcome to the natives. As recently as three months ago a Catholic brother was attacked and severely wounded by a tribe in the Mount Hagen district. A patrol immediately set out and rescued him. But only the airplane made it possible, in the first place, for the missionary to penetrate this remote and dangerous area; and not only the airplane made it possible for him to be rescued and taken back to the coast hospital at Salamoa, where subsequently he died.

The native folk live in villages surrounded by grassy flats and ridges covered with well-drained gardens which are planted with potatoes, yams, and bananas. From their highland domains where they have lived in security for thousands of years, they are now apprehensively watching the irresistible advance of the white man and his great bird. Everywhere the newcomers are penetrating these domains, establishing bases, and maintaining contact with them by emergency landing fields, message boys, signals, and by dropping stores.

Against the civilizing invader, the mountain folk have nothing but their arrows and their fierce hostility. Their "bush telegraph" is inadequate against wireless telephony; their acts are unequal to the system of the administration's patrols; and they do not yet understand fully and universally that friendly co-operation is all that is desired of them!

But the march of civilization goes relentlessly on, and in New Guinea today, the last of the earth's primitive peoples are being brought under control by gold and the airplane.—Australian Press Bureau.
