MONDAY

A very touching and unique ceremony took place at the closing exercises of the Summerside High School when, Mr. Neil McLeod, first principal, was presented, upon his retirement from the School Board after 25 years continued service, with a gold headed walking cane and an address. At the same time the High School was presented with a framed photograph of Mr. McLeod to be hung in the school.

TO CONDUCT COURSE—Dr. Bernhard R. Lomer Librarian of McGill University, Col. Wilfred Bovey and Mrs. Mary Duncan Carter, Montreal, who are to conduct the summer school courses in connection with the new Provincial Library are at present in the city, and will begin work to-day. The first lecture will be given this evening in the Canadian National Hotel. At a later date the lectures will be given at Prince of Wales College.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT—A serious motor accident occurred at Caledonia North on Friday morning when a motor truck in which four young men, Russel Sencaubaugh, John Buel, Messrs Stewart and Porter all of Murray Harbor turned over while driving out from Charlottetown. In going down a steep bank at Caledonia North the steering gear gave way and the car turned completely over. Messrs Sencaubaugh and Buel were both badly hurt the former's face being severely cut from splintered glass. Buel is more seriously injured about the body and is under medical care at his home. The other two passengers escaped with a bad shaking up.

The chapel of St. Dunstan's University, Charlottetown, was the scene of a ceremony of touching significance on the morning of July 1st. Five novices, Sister M. Ursula Cullen, Sister M. Angela Keefe, Sister M. Assumpta Arseneault, Sister M. Charles McPhee and Sister M. Magdalen Connolly pronounced their temporary vows in the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Martha and two sisters, Sister Rose Anna Pitre and Sister M. Immaculate Loughran made their final profession.

A verdict for the plaintiff awarding damages to the extent of \$1500 was brought in by a jury in the case of Wilfred McNally vs. Lorne Sentner and Poole and Thompson Ltd., in the Supreme Court yesterday. The greater part of the day was occupied with addresses by counsel and the charge by Mr. Justice Saunders, who outlined the evidence submitted pertaining to the accident which occurred on the road between Kensington and Summerside on July 13, 1932.

Mr. J. O. C. Campbell first addressed the jury on behalf of the defendant, Sentner. Mr. J. J. Johnson, K. C., followed on behalf of the plaintiff, and Mr. T. A. Campbell spoke for the defendant Poole and Thompson, Ltd. Mr. Justice Saunders then gave his charge and explained points of law.

The jury retired and after deliberating for several hours returned their verdict. His Lordship in his address dealt first with the admitted facts of the case. He then stated that if the jury came to the conclusion that Sentner had driven the car involved in the accident, Poole and Thompson Ltd., were responsible with him for the damages as Sentner drove the car with the consent of the firm. The crucial point to be decided was as to whether or not Sentner had struck the car. Sentner had denied that he had. His Lordship reviewed the evidence as to the time of the accident and pointed out that the accident apparently occurred between 10.30 and 11 p. m. Next morning Sentner had admitted to Corporal MacDonald that he had hit a wagon. The defendant might also have hit a car. There was no evidence that there had been damage to the left front fender of Sentner's car, as might be expected had it struck the plaintiff's car. The stories of the witnesses as to the manner in which the car struck the wagon and the incidents following were then compared. Sentner and Furcell had said that their car had struck a wagon and subsequently struck a bank. There was no bank at the place where the car was struck. The matter of Sentner's departure from the province was also referred to. The onus of proof was on the plaintiff to prove that the defendant had struck the car.

SUMMERSIDE, P. E. I., July 3—Prince Edward Island's first air fatality occurred last evening between 7.30 and 8 o'clock at the entrance to the Exhibition Grounds at Summerside when Herbert J. Mann was killed instantly and burned beyond recognition.

Mr. Mann who is about 25 years of age, was the son of Wm. Mann of Margate. His mother is a sister of C. C. Baker of Kensington. At the time of the accident he was flying a monoplane belonging to Mr. Reginald Pope, Summerside. The plane was one that Mr. Pope had built himself about two years ago. People who had been watching the plane say that they saw Mann flying in the air and appeared to be "doing stunts." Suddenly there was a ripping sound, a part of the wing seemed to break away from the machine and the plane started to tumble down. She landed in the middle of the road outside the entrance to the Exhibition Grounds on Notre Dame Street. Immediately on striking the ground the plane caught fire and in a few minutes was completely burned. The charred body of the victim was found clutching the controls. He was burned beyond recognition and was identified by his boots. It is thought he was dead before the engine caught fire. The Prince Edward Island Light undertaking parlor where an inquest was held.

Mr. Durant was a native of the western part of the Island but had resided in Summerside for over thirty years. Up to the time of his illness he was in the employ of Messrs. Schurman and Company and had been with them both in Kensington and Summerside. He was very highly thought of by his employers for his integrity and obliging manner. He leaves to mourn two sons Roy and Vernon of the Globe Hotel, Summerside. His wife, who was well known to the travelling public, predeceased him about eighteen months ago. The funeral takes place on Wednesday morning at nine o'clock from his late residence on Water Street east to St. Paul's Church and cemetery. S.

RESTING COMFORTABLY —His Honour Lieutenant Governor Dalton was the victim of a regrettable accident yesterday afternoon which prevented his attendance at the opening of the new Prince Edward Island Hospital. Falling on the stairs at Government House, he received a painful scalp wound which necessitated surgical attention but which fortunately is not regarded as being serious. He was reported as resting quite comfortably last night.

As a pleasing coincidence in connection with the first lecture course of the Carnegie Library Demonstration under the McGill Library School, Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, Minister of Education, received on Monday evening a cheque from the Carnegie Foundation for \$15,000.00, being the balance of the \$60,000.00 granted by the Foundation for this year's library demonstration work in Prince Edward Island. The cheque was deposited yesterday in the Bank at an additional exchange valuation of seven and one-half percent in Canadian currency.

An enjoyable dinner was held last night at the Clifton Hotel, Summerside, when the officers of the Light Horse at present in camp at Summerside, were the guests of the officers of C. Company P. E. I. Highlanders.

There were a few invited guests, besides. Lieut. A. G. Dawson presided and welcomed the Light Horse. Col. Andrews and Major Lowther replied. Lieut. Col. Strong and Major F. F. May also spoke on behalf of the Highlanders. Lieut.

Owing to an unfortunate accident, His Honour Lieutenant Governor Dalton was unable to be present, but his good wishes for the occasion were presented by Hon. Dr. MacMillan. A feature of the addresses was the highly commendatory remarks of Mr. Neergaard, New York, who is an internationally known authority on hospital construction, and Dr. Agnew, secretary of the Department of Hospital Service, both of whom stressed the unique advantages of the new Prince Edward Island Hospital. After the formal programme, a procession took place to the main doors of the hospital, and during the latter part of the afternoon the institution was crowded with interested visitors.

Com. T. H. S. Jackson, of the Royal Navy also spoke and complimented the officers on the excellent representation of the Canadian Militia, which the Island could claim.

Last evening Mr. E. W. MacKinnon, Superintendent Canadian National Railways, Charlottetown, in the presence of Mr. F. W. Freeman, Regional Organizer First Aid, C. N. Dr. J. S. Jenkins was the examiner, each class having been instructed by Mr. Freeman. Mr. Stewart Graham, Federal Inspector of Aviation, who arrived in Summerside at 9.30 yesterday morning from Halifax, was busy all day making official investigation into Monday's airplane accident which caused the death of Herbert J. Mann.

Mr. Graham completed his investigation by 5 p.m. and flew immediately back to the mainland. After inspecting what was left of the machine and interviewing several eye-witnesses and Mr. Reginald Pope, owner of the plane, Mr. Graham expressed the opinion that the accident was purely accidental and that the plane was perfectly airworthy previous to the accident.

Mr. Clifford Mann, brother of the victim, was at the scene of the tragedy when the ill-fated machine came down. Seeing it burst into flames he rushed forward to get his brother out of the mass of wreckage, and himself sustained painful burns. He was taken from the scene by some of the members of the P. E. Island Light Horse. Spectators of the accident expressed astonishment that no one was injured as there were crowds standing all around watching the plane.

Magnificent summer weather favored the formal opening ceremonies at the new Prince Edward Island Hospital yesterday afternoon, where, at a flag decked platform on the lawn east of the new building, an inspiring programme was given. The various addresses and other features were heard with the utmost interest by upward of fifteen hundred people, representative of all sections of the Province, who had gathered on the grounds for the occasion.

The function, which was jointly presided over by Mr. James Paton and Dr. J. A. Clark, opened with the hymn "O God our Help in Ages Past" sung by a combined city choir and audience under the direction of Mr. Mason B. MacKay. Opening remarks by Mr. Paton, and prayer, led by Dr. Clark.

Hon. W. J. P. MacMillan, M. D., Minister of Health and Acting Premier, Hon. W. M. Lea, His Worship Mayor Stewart, Mr. C. R. Rogers, representing the trustee board of the Prince County Hospital, Rev. A. J. MacIntyre and Dr. J. D. McGuigan, representatives of the Charlottetown Hospital, Mr. W. P. Tidmarsh, chairman of the 1930 Hospital campaign; Mr. Charles F. Neergaard, the Hospital Consultant, New York; Dr. G. Harvey Agnew, secretary of the Department of Hospital Service, Canadian Hospital Council; and Mr. James Gowan, architect.

On the platform were seated representatives of the Provincial Government, the Senate and House of Commons, the Legislature and City Council, as well as members of the clergy, the medical profession, trustee board, the nursing staffs of the three provincial hospitals, the City Council, School Board, Ladies Aid Society, the Wobelo Club and other institutions.
