Terrible Drug Crisis In City of Montreal

MONTREAL, Sept. 25.—According to the local authorities the bulk of the illicit drug cargoes peddled here are received from Germany where absolutely no check is being maintained on exports of this kind.

"The situation in Montreal is terrible, and it seems to be steadily growing worse," Coroner McMahon declared today shortly after leaving court where a verdict was returned holding a Chinese criminally responsible for the death of a youth who died the night before last in the general hospital from the effect of drugs. "We must attack it at the roots," said the Coroner, "we must prevent narcotics reaching here, except to responsible authorities. Germany is reaping a huge fortune from the traffic she has developed in them. While every other industry may have advanced her drug trade has grown by leaps and bounds."

"Before the war, I believe, she exercised some control over her exports of drugs, but now I would seem that she is flooding the world with them."

"God knows where we are coming to," was the comment of D. A. Laforune, K. C. M. P. Crown Prosecutor, as he left court at the conclusion of the first session of the trial of Yvonne Lesbians, alias Proulx, held for the death of Alfred Pentaine, who died following an injection of heroin in June last.

"Can you imagine drug 'parties' where as many as fourteen persons are 'heaped up' over the other in a state of semi or total unconsciousness? Have we reached the limits of perversion or are we to see worse? Has our moral sense broken down? God knows. There must be something done, and I do not believe that 'something' is being done now. Perhaps it lies in sterner treatment of those whom we find guilty, perhaps it lies elsewhere, but it must be found."

During the past week a ghastly drama has been enacted almost daily at the general hospital. It is usually brought to its climax as cold gray dawn breaks and the shrunken human stretched out on a blanket on the floor—the last victim of the narcotic epidemic—whose death made futile the frantic all-night efforts of a corps of medical men and attendants.

Princess Hermine Beloved At Home

CASTLE SAADOR, German Silesia, Sept. 25.—Here in the home of Princess Hermine Von Schoenrich-Carolath there is no feeling but a pleasurable excitement over the news that she is to marry the former Kaiser.

She has not been home since the secret came out, so a real country hospitable reception of congratulatory letters is awaiting her when she returns from her official visit to the Grand Duchess of Baden, the former Kaiser's aunt. Whatever the opinion in monarchistic circles elsewhere in Germany, here in the old castle next to the Polish border is nothing but cheerful anticipation of her arrival.

The correspondent who voyaged here from Goentfeld, was received in the mediaeval castle with inter-late Prince Von Schoenrich-Carolath. All of them were eager to know more about the coming wedding than they have heard through the newspapers.

Loved by Everyone.

In the walled and moated castle, sitting in the mediaeval hall, filled with old portraits, antlers, stuffed wild dogs, etc., the correspondent heard how Hermine is loved by everyone in the region who knows how she sacrificed the best years of her life to her tubercular husband. As the whole household expressed itself:

"The princess has a heart of gold. Everybody likes her and she seems to have in her a need to sacrifice herself. Her childhood was sacrificed to her strange, reclusive father, the Prince of Reuss. Her young married life was spent in nursing her husband. And now her heart is touched by the sight of the Kaiser, hardly in Doorn."

"She happened to be invited to Doorn because she expressed her sympathy so touchingly at the Kaiser's death. Then last June she was invited to Doorn."

Beyond that the household knows only what it has read in the newspapers.

Former Kaiser Has Rival.

But they do know that former Kaiser has rival in princess' nephew, the young prince Von Schoenrich, who adores his aunt and pleaded with her to marry him after his uncle's death. The whole countryside knows the story of this wooing. Finding it impossible to interest Hermine, who persisted in treating him like a small boy, he hoped to touch her heart by pretending death.

He sent a telegram telling how he died, and announcing that the body was being sent to Saabor. The princess was shocked and grieved, but remembering the family duty, ordered everything ready for the burial in the family cemetery.

Wakes are the custom in this part of the country as they are in Ireland. There must be a funeral feast and the whole district comes to eat and mourn. Dozens of chickens were baked, whole pigs were roasted, the family tomb was opened and the pastor was ready; everything was on hand, except the garments for the coffin. Finally he came, but alive.

Hermine is too good-natured to be angry at the hoax, but her neighbors say with a smile that it did not advance her nephew's courtship. The princess has had little joy in her life, although she is by nature gay, and now shows signs of sorrow. During the war and since, until the last year, she had little money, and lived simply in the old castle. But in the last months she got better prices for her grain and was able to afford luxuries and ravel.

Her castle is primitive with few comforts and she can hardly regret leaving and Saabor, even for Doorn. But everybody in the neighborhood will regret her leaving.

Duchess of Baden Approves.

"Of the Hohenzollern only the Duchess of Baden favors the wedding, and she intends to attend it. Despite her eighty-four years this laughter of Kaiser Wilhelm I, is the real head of the family, and a forceful one. She declares there is no occasion for criticism as this is not the first time a Hohenzollern married a Reuss."

So she has summoned Prince Axel Friedrich and his wife to come to her castle, Mahau, and teach an understanding with Hermine. The old duchess is managing everything, even to deciding which of Hermine's children will go to Doorn. The princess will take the three youngest with her, the two eldest boys being already in the Academy of Nobles in Zuelisau.

The duchess evidently likes her prospective niece, who is a clever woman despite her having been brought up in the provinces. But Hermine is easily influenced and

One of the nobles, the Prince of Ratibor, even went down to Doorn to remonstrate with his former ruler in person. But the moment he revealed his mission, Wilhelm rang for a servant and said: "The gentleman wishes his hat."
