Trade locally is a little quiet in provisions just now, says the Maritime Merchant. There is a little barrelled pork moving, lard is moving very well, and there is only a fair trade in smoked meats. But the holiday quietness in commodities does not give place to more activity. Hog have advanced a quarter of a cent in Prince Edward Island, but the Chicago markets is not any firmer than it has been. A little bit later on perhaps by early spring, an advance will take place, it is thought, but for the present things are running along about on an even keel.

On account of the price of hide having dropped the trade requires a better price on beef says the Maritime Merchant, Halifax. The hide represents one-eighth of the weight of the animal and when any important drop in value of the hide occurs a better price for the dressed meat is necessary to even up the profit. The demand locally is very good, the steamship business in the winter months contributing greatly to the result. There is plenty of frozen pork to be had, but supplies of fresh killed are scarce. Prince Edward Island is sending fair quantities to the Halifax market. The fishermen in the near vicinity of Halifax, who usually buy pork cut extensively for winter use, have turned their attention more to beef this year.

The home of Joseph Merritt, 51 Bannatyne avenue, Winnipeg, was the scene of a very pretty wedding on Monday evening, when George W. Merritt and Miss Lilian Sutherland were united in marriage. At the request of George W. Johnson a copy of the Charlottetown Guardian has been forwarded to him to be used as indicated in the following article, which appeared in a recent issue of the New York Herald (George W. Johnson, an old-time Harlem River oarsman, now living here is constructing a peculiar boat in which he contemplates rowing from St. Augustine, Fla., to New York via the inside route—through the sounds, bays and canals—next spring. The boat is to be constructed of newspapers and to be in the form of a shell, with a little more than the ordinary racing type. Mr. Johnson rowed from New York to Boston in 1888 in a somewhat similar craft. The length of the cruising shell is twenty feet by twenty inches beam, six inches deep and it will have ten water-tight bulkheads. The boat is to be constructed entirely of newspapers. Mr. Johnson hopes to have in the craft a copy of every daily paper in the United States. About twenty thicknesses of paper is to be used for the hull of the shell, which will be made in a mold under pressure, producing a composition harder and tougher than any wood. The deck will be similarly constructed of paper, and the headings of the various papers will be used as a mosaic for the outside coating. The mould is all ready at Mr. Johnson's bazaar, St. Augustine, and as soon as newspapers are sent in in sufficient quantity Mr. Johnson will begin work on his novel craft.

The Guardian has received from the fassey Harris a large calendar for his year, the frontpiece for which is a picture of the Pileated woodpecker.

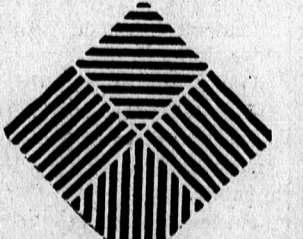
St. Paul's entertainments are always of a high class so you will not be disappointed on Tuesday evening, 4th February, as the committee intends this one to be the best yet.

The Guardian has received from J. R. Riddick, Dairy and Cold Storage commissioner the following circular: Geo. H. Barr, a member of my staff, who was Official Referee of utter and cheese at Montreal last season in speaking of his visit to the recent Dairy Convention held at Letou, Ont., made the statement that "only 2 per cent of the cheese which he examined were of No. 1 quality." The statement has been widely quoted showing a serious condition in the Canadian Cheese trade. As there is nothing in the statement itself or in the facts of the case to warrant such a conclusion, I ask your permission to make the following explanation. As Mr. Barr explained in his statement, he examined less than half of 1 per cent of about one lot out of every 200 lots of cheese received at Montreal during the season, and further, as he was asked to examine only those lots which were suspected of being inferior in quality, or which had been condemned by the purchasers, it is not surprising that only 2 per cent were first quality. The showing is a remarkably good one rather than an abominable one. As a matter of fact, the quality of Canadian cheese never stood as high as it does at the present time. More improvement has been made in the last year or two than for many years previous. The writer has just returned from a lengthy visit to the market of Great Britain and can speak with confidence on that point.

### Test For Astigmatism.

### Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

A by-law numbered section of Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 21, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section 150 s. more or less.

Applications for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Land office or Subagency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may however be made at an agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of any intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desire perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased) of homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with that (a) mother.

(4) The term "residence" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than five miles in a direct line towards the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement.

(5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the agent for the district of such intention.

Six months' notice must be given by the homesteader to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of intention to apply for patent.
