strongly was the visit of our distinguished leader, the Honorable R. B. Bennett. Whatever misgivings we might have had regarding his ability or capacity for leadership were forever removed as we hear from his own lips in eloquent and straightforward language the great National Policy of "Canada for the Canadians" propounded, and demonstrated by facts and figures that remain indisputable and uncontradicted.

Need of Adequate Protection

The new tariff legislation enacted at a special session of the American Congress, striking directly at our exports of farm products to that country, has brought home to us more forcibly than ever the necessity of adequate tariff protection, and has even compelled the reluctant Liberal party to admit that upward revision of the tariff is now a necessity. The result of the elections, in Provincial politics run hand in hand, shows the trend of public opinion even in a Province, proverbially favorable to low tariffs, and incidentally may be analyzed as the handwriting on the wall portraying the impending doom of the King Government.

The administration of Provincial affairs under the hap-hazard, happy-go-lucky Saunders regime continues on its course of gross incompetence. Failures to substantiate, or obtain recognition of, our claims at Ottawa, increase of the public debt and vast expenditures of public monies without regard to service or efficiency constitute their record of Government since taking office whilst the pre-election promise to make the Prohibition Act "more workable" has been implemented by such extreme and such farcical legislation that the Act is now as workable as dough and may be stretched, twisted and contorted into any desired shape at the will of anyone of the little army of political heeled, who have been called to the colors to banish the Demon Rum from our fair land.

With conditions such as these prevailing under Liberal rule - Provincial and Federal - whilst we must necessarily deplore the mal-administration of public business, and suffer our share of the additional burden imposed on us and our posterity, yet we can not forego a grim smile of satisfaction as we look forward to the day of reckoning - not far distant - when the voice of the people shall be heard again and those would be rulers shall return again to the pleasant paths of private life, from which, in the word of one of their own doughty champions "they should never have wandered without a guardian."

In conclusion I wish to express my thanks for the confidence that you have, in the past, reposed in me, and for the generous support and consideration given me by all officers and members of this Association at all times. I, on my part, have done my best to uphold the best traditions of this honorable position, and have given unsparingly of my time and energy in the discharge of the duties involved thereby, and shall now feel relieved to transfer the mantle of responsibility to more worthy shoulders.
