NEW ELECTRIC RATES

The Maritime Electric Company has filed with the Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities for Prince Edward Island complete new rate schedules which are effective July 1st and on which July 31st bills will be rendered. These rates supersede rates fixed by contract with the City of Charlottetown in 1928 and are materially beneficial to our residential and commercial consumers of Charlottetown and Montague District. We estimate that our consumers will benefit on present consumption to the extent of \$9,826.62 per year. This offer to our customers of lower rates is entirely voluntary and in recognition of business and agricultural conditions at this time. The Company's earnings are far below a legal "fair return", but as many of our customers are likewise suffering, this voluntary offer of lower rates on our part is based on cooperation with our customers. The new rates which are of interest to most of our customers are as follows:—

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CHARLOTTETOWN RATES

COMMERCIAL Service Charge 15c per month per 100 watts for the first 5000 watts of Rated Demand. 10c per month per 100 watts for all Rated Demand in excess of 5000 watts. Energy Charge First 100 k.w.h. used per month at 7c per k.w.h. Next 100 k.w.h. used per month at 5c per k.w.h. Over 200 k.w.h. used per month at 3 1/2c per k.w.h. Minimum Charge \$1.00 per month. NOTE: The new Service Charge is very much lower than the old and permits additional lighting at considerably reduced rates.

RESIDENTIAL First K. W. H. First 5 k.w.h. (or less) used per month \$1.00. Next 25 k.w.h. per month at 7c per k.w.h. Over 30 k.w.h. per month at 3 1/2c per k.w.h. Minimum Charge \$1.00 per month. NOTE: Elimination of the Service Charge effects several thousand dollars reduction to residential consumers and gives all small consumers 5 k.w.h. for \$1.00.

OFF-PEAK HEATING Service Charge \$1.25 per month per kilowatt of connected load. Energy Charge 1.5 cents per k.w.h. Minimum Bill \$2.50 per month per meter. NOTE: This is a new rate which makes possible the heating of water for domestic or other purposes at a reasonable cost.
