THE St. John Telegraph says: Peter W. Gordon, a bright and popular newspaper worker in St. John, one of the Star staff, yesterday received the degree of M. A., at Acadia College, Wolfville.

The services in the Methodist Church at Margate on Sunday morning June 2nd, were of a most solemn and impressive character. The pastor, Rev. W. A. Thomson, extended the right hand of fellowship to eighteen persons, nearly all of whom were from the Clinton portion of the congregation.

The cargo of the S. S. Probus consists of 18,000 sacks common Liverpool salt, 840 factory filled sacks, 20 tons Prussian rock salt. The steamer displays the Swedish flag having recently been purchased by the present owners from the Prince S. S. Co., New Castle. The ship is 254 feet long and is looked upon as a strong one. On the way to this port some rough weather was experienced and a number of barrels of tar were washed overboard. The glass in the port holes in the bow of the ship was shivered to bits by the tossing of the heavy sea. The ship which is painted lead color is being repainted black.

A TRURO despatch says:—On account of the groom's family being in mourning the nuptials of Frank Stanfield and Miss Sarah Emma Thomas, second daughter of ex-Mayor Thomas, were celebrated yesterday in the presence of only members of the families of the contracting parties. The large parlor of the Thomas residence was beautifully decorated with palms, ferns and cut flowers, the pretty and artistic work of young friends of the bride, and in this handsome room, without bridesmaid or "best man," the Rev. A. D. Myrton, in the short but impressive ceremony of the Methodist church, pronounced our young friends "man and wife." At the station an unusually large number of young friends had gathered to extend good wishes, and in abundance was showered over Mr. and Mrs. Frank Stanfield as they started off on their wedding tour to Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa, the Pan American Exposition.

A LARGE crowd was very much interested at the Queen Square, Chatham, last Thursday evening in the climbing of the flagstaff there by a young man named Lawrence, who belonged to a P. E. I. schooner which lay at one of the wharves. He happened to hear Alderman Wise say that he would like to find some one who could go up to the truck of the staff and reeve the new halyards, the old ones having been carelessly allowed to remain unrenewed until they parted last summer, and he volunteered to do the job at once. Proceeding to the Square he went hand over hand, one of the stays of the mast until he reached the round top at its head and, without delay, he kept on with remarkable agility up the stays of the topmast to the bare pole, which he climbed until he was breast high above the truck. Then he quickly reeved the new halyard and descended, carrying its end with him to the round-top at the foot of the topmast. Here he found that he had left the line twisted around one of the stays where it joined the topmast head, so he went up again as quickly and easily as before, made everything right and again descended, and came rapidly down to the ground, bringing the end of the line with him. He was heartily applauded, and received \$5 for the job.—Chatham Advance.

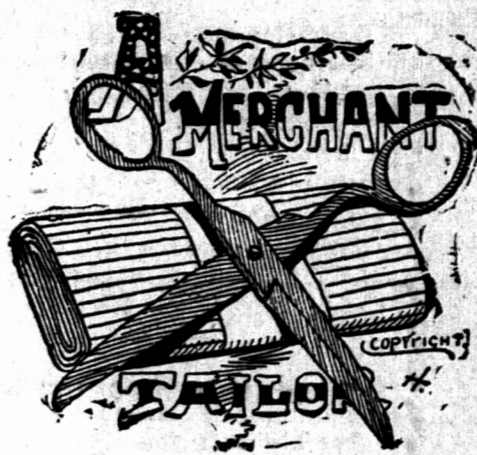

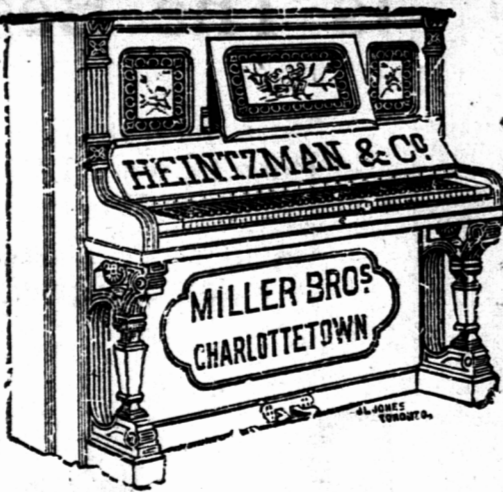
