A REGRETTABLE OUTBREAK

George E. Saville of Dundas writes us at length detailing the features of a drunken debauch on the train between this city and St. Peter's on 11th October. It appears that by some means a supply of liquor had been procured, and men, old and young, and women also, drank till they were intoxicated. Mr. Saville says "the temperance people of Charlottetown have no right to allow the young men, and in too many instances the old men from the country to be debauched by their fellow townsmen." He calls for the enforcement of the law, and wants inspectors on the train to arrest drunken persons and compel them to tell where they got the liquor or go to jail. He also commends the tact and patience of the train men in handling such a crowd.

We thank Mr. Saville for his letter but do not think its publication in full would help the cause which he and The Guardian have so much at heart. The occurrence he records is most regrettable. But too much prominence ought not to be given to one outbreak of drinking in face of the good order and sobriety that was maintained on the Exhibition grounds and in the city during the week, which was the subject of much favorable comment by visitors and others. It would be most unjust to "the temperance people of Charlottetown," who have been so untiring in their efforts, and who have expended so much of their time and money for the cause, to hold them under censure for a drinking bout which occurred outside the city, even if the liquor was by secret means procured here.

THE EXHIBITION.

The exhibition is now over. Much was promised in advance, and more elaborate preparations were made than ever before, and yet from the start there was lacking that measure of popular enthusiasm which has sometimes been felt. This is hard to explain. Much depends upon the weather in Exhibitions, too, and the cold of the opening day, and the storm of Thursday, with the distraction of the Summerside fire added, were serious obstacles in the way of what would otherwise have been a most brilliant success in every way.

And despite all drawbacks it was a great show, the best we have ever had and pronounced by good judges the best ever seen in Eastern Canada, in live stock it was simply magnificent and strong in almost every line. In the fruits of the field it was excellent. Our stock men were in a number of lines out-classed, but held their own well when competing with the best in Canada. The disbursements in prizes far exceed any previous Exhibition held here. A word is due to the hard-worked President and Directors and officials who were indefatigable in their efforts. Space will not permit us to say more today.

The statement in Saturday's issue that the darkness in the northern part of the city on Thursday evening caused by a fuse blowing out "was not of long duration," and that "repairs were effected in reasonable time and the light restored," was based upon information supplied to The Guardian. It turns out to be quite untrue. Many lights in the section referred to were out all night.

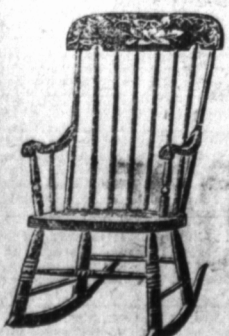

Synopsis of Canadian North HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 24, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less. Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. Entries must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. A homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. (3) Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands Ottawa of intention to apply for patent. Deputy of the Minister of the Interior. N.
