

HUMBERT'S ASSASSIN

Sentenced to Imprisonment For Life

VERY NARROW ESCAPE

Bubonic Plague Cases - Poverty Stricken Miner - Beresford Wins.

TRIAL OF HUMBERT'S ASSASSIN.

MILAN Aug. 29-(Special).-The trial of Bresci for the murder of King Humbert commenced to-day.

Bresci on examination declared he decided to kill King Humbert after the events in Milan and Sicily to avenge the misery of the people and his own, adding, "I acted without advice or accomplice."

GETS LIFE IMPRISONMENT.

Bresci was pronounced guilty and sentenced to life imprisonment, which in Italy is the extreme penalty of the law, capital punishment having been abolished some years ago.

LORD BERESFORD WINS.

LONDON Aug. 29-(Special).-Lord Beresford's bay mare Jiffy 3rd to-day won the great Eton Handicap place of 1,000 sovereigns at the York August meeting. Nine horses ran.

BUBONIC PLAGUE CASES.

GLASGOW Aug. 29-(Special).-Two girls and boys, members of Island (?) families have fallen victims to bubonic plague.

The attacks are less violent than the cases that have already proved fatal.

POVERTY STRICKEN MINERS.

SEATTLE, Aug. 29-(Special).-The United States transport Lownd reached here from Nome, with 220 passengers, two-thirds of whom are desolate miners returning at the expense of the Government.

RUSSIA GIVES NOTICE

The Relief of Legations Ends the Military Task of Allies.

HOW RUSSIA VIEWS IT.

LONDON, Aug. 29-(Special).-There is no definite news from China.

An unconfirmed special from St. Petersburg contains the assertion that Russia almost immediately will notify the powers that she considers the relief of the Pekin Legations as the final accomplishment of the military task of the Allied powers.

SETTLEMENT WILL BE TEDIOUS.

TEAM FOR HALIFAX

Islanders To Compete for Championships

RECORDS OF THE MEN

Some of The Things They Have Done-Hopes Are High.

On Friday morning the 'Abegeit-Crescent Athletic Club track team will leave by the Princess for Halifax to compete at the Maritime Championship against the creme de la creme of Maritime athletes.

That they may do themselves and the Garden of the Gulf honor is the wish of every Islander. The team is under the captaincy and management of Mr. D. A. McKinnon.

A short history of the members of the team will be of interest.

W. H. Ritchie will compete in 100 and 220 yard dashes. Harry is the only Islander entry in these events. He has a good record as sprinter having won second place at the M. P. A. A. games in the 100 for two years. His records are as follows:

100 yards 10 3-5 220 " 23 3-5

C. J. McMillan will compete in 440 and Broad Jump. His performances are familiar to followers of sport throughout the provinces. He held the championship for 440 yards during 1897-1898 but did not compete last year. His record of 53 sec. is the best ever made by an Islander.

P. A. Duffy will compete in 440 and 880. He is a runner of remarkable endurance. He has been in competition three years and has acquitted himself very creditably. His records are for 440-54 2-5; 880-2 12 3-5.

Leslie Adams is another entry in the 880.

Les has been in only a few competitions but has always borne himself with credit. His record for the 100 is 2 12 3-5. J. R. Darke is entered for the Hammer and Shot. Joe has a record of 24 feet for the shot made at the championships last year.

He has also hurled the Hammer close to 100 feet.

H. Sprague will also compete in the Weights.

He is a perfect specimen of muscularity and we look for good results from him.

W. Jones the Pownal athlete is entered for the Hammer Throw and Weight. He is a coming record breaker. In his initial competition he hurled the missile 95 feet and will improve on that at Halifax.

K. McPherson of Uigg will take part in the hurdles, high jump and broad jump. Kenny is a splendid broad jumper and expert hurdler and can be depended upon to make points in these events. His records are Broad 19ft 11in. Hurdles 18 2-5 sec.

R. A. Donahoe, the Cardigan wonder, will compete in high jump, broad jump, pole vault and shot put. He is one of the best all around athletes the Island has ever produced and his performances will open the eyes of the Halifaxians. His records are

High 5ft 6. Broad 19ft 2 Shot 33ft

D. A. McKinnon who captains the team will be a competitor in the one mile run which championship he has held three years. He has had scarcely a week's training and is still suffering from a sprained ankle, so that this event will go to Halifax, who in the person of Mr. Murphy have a distance runner of remarkable ability. McKinnon's records are

SEPTEMBER 2. THE SEVENTY SEVENTH. GOLDEN TEXT.

The harvest truly is great, but the labourers are few.-Luke 10, 2. LESSON HELPS.

1. "After these things"-Christ's farewell to Galilee and departure for the feast of tabernacles at Jerusalem. Or, according to another view, at the commencement of a journey in Perea. The chronology difficult. "Other seventy"-in addition to the twelve. (Luke 9, 1-4.) "The number had evident referring to the elders of Moses (Num, 11, 19) where there is the same variation; the Sanhedrim; and the Jewish belief (derived from Gen. 10) as to the number of nations of the world."

Farrar. The kingdom of Christ aggressive, progressive, expansive. First, 12 apostles; then 70 preachers; then 500 brethren; then thousands!"-Van Doren. "Two and two"-As with the twelve. (Mark 6, 7.) For mutual advice and encouragement; because of their different personalities and methods of work; and because the word of two witnesses is confirmatory. Reformers in different ages seem to come in pairs, as Moses and Aaron, Elijah and Elisha, Huss and Jerome, Luther and Melancthon; and we may add, in a later reformation, Wesley and Fletcher."-Whedon. Learn here the value of co-operative work. "They were to preach unto two Jew and Gentile; out of two, law and Gospel; the love of two, God and man; by two works, doctrine and life; the two tables of the law; to save two, body and soul; to join two, heaven and earth, God and man."-Austin.

"Before his face"-As fore-runners. His own remaining time for work was short. "Every city and place"-In Perea, presumably, the seventy preached both in the cities and unwallied towns, Christ following with his personal ministry in the former. It is not probable that he went into every place where his heralds went."-Abbott.

2. "The harvest"-A figure already employed. (Matt. 9, 37, 38; John 4, 35, "Send forth labourers"- "God alone can do this."-Benson.

3. "Your ways"-Thirty-five different pairs of disciples went out in thirty-five different directions.

4. "Carry neither purse," etc.-"Set out just as you are; God will provide for all your wants."-Godet. "Salute no man"-Because of the time consumed. "It is said that a complete formal salutation between two orientals may consume from one to three hours."-Abbott.

5. "Into whatsoever house"-The law of hospitality allows a traveller to stay three days in a house to which he comes for entertainment without disclosing even his business."-Hall. "Peace," etc.-The ordinary Jewish salutation.

6. "If the son of peace," etc.-"That is, if the people respond in the spirit of your salutation, making your mission welcome, then let your blessing rest there. If not, your prayer shall return into your own bosom."-Cowles.

7. "Whatsoever city"-As in a private house.

8. "Heal the sick"-These miracles were in part the credentials of their divine mission."-Cowles. "It is remarkable, however, that the seventy on their return speak of no other healing of the sick than the casting out of the demons."-Lange. "And say"-Miracles are the ringing of the great bell of the universe to call attention to the doctrine."-Foster. "The kingdom"- "Conquerors take away kingdoms; the heralds of Christ offer a kingdom."-Van Doren.

9. "Even the very dust"-symbolic action. The strict Jews did this in leaving a heathen city. So Paul, at Antioch. (Acts 13, 51.) It was a Jewish maxim that the very dust of such a city was defiling. "Is come nigh" surely, lovingly, repeatedly. Life is crowded with opportunities to enter the kingdom.

10. "Returned again with joy"-Delighted by their supernatural power.

11. "I beheld"- "I was beholding." While they were rejoicing over the small triumphs of the present he was contemplating the complete triumph of the future. "So tan as lightning fall heaven"-not from the abode of the blessed, but from his position of power, the complete overthrow of badness.

12. "Nothing shall by any means hurt you"- "Man is immortal until his work is done."

13. "In this rejoice not"-Eternal salvation is more to be desired than a transitory possession of power. "Your names are written in heaven"-It is possible for every person to insure a record of his name.

BULLER'S SUCCESS

He Occupied Machododorp Yesterday.

BOERS FLY NORTHWARD

Each Drives Both's Men - British Casualties not Very Heavy.

BULLER IN MACHODODORP.

LONDON, Aug. 29-(Special).-Lord Roberts reports under date 28th, that Gen. Buller's advance occupied Machododorp this afternoon.

ENEMY RETREATED NORTHWARD.

The enemy made a poor stand and retired northward, followed by Dundonald's mounted troops who could not proceed beyond Halvela owing to the difficult nature of the country and the fact that the enemy had taken up a position too strong to be dislodged by mounted troops.

FRENCH MEETS WITH SUCCESS. Gen. Buller's casualties were few. Gen. French continued his movements to-day, as far as Elandsfontein, turning the enemy out without difficulty. The latter retired rapidly leaving cooked food behind.

GEN. BULLER'S CASUALTIES. Gen. Buller's casualties on the 27th, were, killed, one officer and 13 men; wounded, seven officers and 57 men.
