pany has bonds and notes outstanding equal to \$64,050 per mile. The average value per mile of bonds and stocks owned is \$16,597 per mile.

After deducting this amount from the bonded indebtedness it leaves a probable figure of \$47,453 per mile ahead of the issue of \$14,012 per mile of 5 per cent. non-cumulative preferred stock.
