free from casein to the walls and ceilings, that they would clear up mould at least in the best way that the patrons of the factories that this should be done.

Trade With Newfoundland - Regarding our trade with Newfoundland which we have been studying for the past year and half, we have come to the conclusion that at the present time the best way to overcome our difficulties is to cooperate with the Newfoundland Government and the Canadian Government in a more orderly way than heretofore. We have found out that the official shipping companies of the Newfoundland Government is the Montreal Shipping Co. (M.S.C.) Limited. We have contacted their manager who is very sympathetic to the Newfoundland Government to place a base for this trade immediately, and they will supply us with whatever size of boat we require. It is expected that within the next ten days the first trip will be made and that these trips will be continued throughout the whole season fortnightly.

In early June of this year, we sent a Trade Agent to Newfoundland who has studied conditions throughout the whole island exhaustively, and his due to his efforts that we now understand the situation so well. Newfoundland, for instance, requires a year's hay as much as we do. The hay is produced in the large amount of hay on Prince Edward Island. It will be required in Newfoundland and that we are ready to make contracts now at \$19.00 a ton on board at Charlottetown. It is worth the effort to the farmers from \$13.00 to \$14.00 a ton, or \$16.00 to \$17.00 a ton. The Newfoundland Government requires in general, containing around 40 per cent of clover. There are firms in Newfoundland that will require over 1,000 tons for their operations, and I would suggest that possibly 10,000 tons will be in high demand at a figure not less than \$19.00, and possibly higher.

Our government already is trying to procure hay, and a special effort should be made to fit up and man all hay presses in the province. Hay presses work that should have high priority. If cattle for the Newfoundland market are available in quantity a sufficient number of steamships will be provided to carry them at the same rate as the Halifax to St. Johns rates.

Family Allowances - An enactment of special interest, particularly for Prince Edward Island, provides for the payment of Family Allowances starting July 1, 1944. The plan now stands parents of children under 16 years of age receive \$10.00 per month for each child under 6 years of age, \$12.00 for each child from 6 to 9 years of age, \$15.00 for each child from 10 to 13 years of age, and \$18.00 for each child 13 to 16 years of age. This means that on Prince Edward Island we shall receive upwards of \$100,000 and one-quarter million dollars a year, payable to parents of children. The island especially benefits under this plan because the income tax is very low, particularly in the rural districts, while the families are the highest in Canada exclusive of Quebec.
