Improved Driving Stressed In Speech At Good Roads Meet

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BIGWIN INN, Ont., Sept. 8.—Reduction of the automobile accident rate depended mostly on improved driving practices rather than law enforcement must be directed primarily to that end, Howard M. Baker, traffic engineer of the Montreal Police Department, said in a speech prepared for the delivery of the annual convention of the Canadian Good Roads Association.

Scheduled also on the program was a discussion of "Ontario's Driver Control System" by J. P. Bickell, registrar of motor vehicles in that province. Delegates also heard the presidential report of Hon. F. MacPherson, British Columbia Minister of Public Works.

Although reckless, inefficient or drunken driving was a factor in causing accidents, Mr. Baker said the vast majority of persons involved in accidents were honest, law-abiding citizens, driving competently and with reasonable caution.

Enforcement inflicted in a spirit of revenge defeated its own end and wronged the community. It should seek to correct and educate. Suspensions and revocations of licenses had greater deterrent effect on erring drivers than almost any other punitive measure.

Convictions should always be followed by punishment but the penalties should be neither unusual nor unreasonable.

Where the human element is involved there is such a thing as absolute control," Mr. Bickell said. No amount of education or regulation would make every individual act according to its best interests.
