Musical Recital At St. Pauls Church

A most delightful and interesting musical recital was given Sunday night in St. Paul's Church by Mr. Royston F. Mugford, organist of the church, and Mr. Raoul Raymond, bass, and soloist of St. James Church choir.

The programme, which was very tuneful and with much appeal to the average listener, was as follows:

- Tenth Concerto for organ and orchestra (Handel, arr. for organ, Gullmant). Gavotte (Wesley) — Royston F. Mugford. The Last Chord (Sullivan). Cantique (Beethoven) — Raoul Raymond. Scherzo in F. (Parry).

Paraphrase on "See the Conquering Hero Comes" (Gullmant) — Royston F. Mugford. Eternal Ruler of the Skies (Mozart). Celebrons le Seigneur (Rupes) — Raoul Raymond. Carillon de Westminster (Vierne). Crown Imperial (Waltos). (This march was written for the Coronation of 1937, and was one of the preludes to the recent Royal wedding in Westminster Abbey) — Royston F. Mugford.

Praise God from Whom all blessings flow. This is the first time Charlottetown has had the pleasure of hearing Mr. Mugford in recital, and no music lover could have been disappointed, for Mr. Mugford has a brilliant technique. Not only this, but the crispness of his phrasing, the lightness of his rhythm and accentuation—unusually difficult to obtain on the organ, and his quite faultless registration, made his playing most clear and careful preparation in the getting ready of his programme. And his excellent playing was his great reward.

Mrs. Raymond is well known to Charlottetown listeners, and we can only say, that his presentation was up to his own very high standard, and that his splendid voice was a treat to listen to. As to the pieces which seemed particularly noteworthy, one might well mark Handel's Tenth Concerto which, though the orchestra was missing, was very clearly and capably arranged for organ alone by Gullmant. Also very fine

for the afternoon and a duet sweetly rendered by Bernice Lewis and Hazel Andrew. Another vocal duet by Eileen Cooke and Eileen Cooke, by Blackfoot Collection for day was fifty-six cents.
