**Impressive Service At Alberton**

OVER REMAINS OF LATE DIVINITY STUDENTS.  
 A joint funeral service was held in the Presbyterian Church, Alberton, Thursday morning over the remains of the two young Divinity students, Mr. Howard Hill of Carleton Place, Ontario, and Mr. George Harris of Halifax, the former supplying the latter for the Anglican Church during the summer months.  
 The Church was filled to overflowing, while many were unable to gain admittance,—the yard around the church being filled with cars and carriages.  
 The Rev. Sinclair Jeans of Summerside Presbyterian Church presided. Scripture was read by Mr. Wilson of the Princeton Theological Seminary a close friend and fellow student of the late Mr. Hill. Prayer was offered by the Rev. M. Scott Fulton, Charlottetown, also by Rev. Mr. Spriggs of Kensington representing the Anglican Church. Short addresses were given by Rev. R. H. Stayer, Hunter River, secretary of the Home Mission Board of the

Presbyterian Church, Rev. A. S. Weir, United Church, Alberton, Rev. Mr. Williams, Ontario and Rev. Dr. Thompson, Alberton.  
 Many theories have been put forward as to the manner in which these two estimable young men came to their death, what really occurred was probably never known. Mrs. Bowness, Undertaker at Summerside, is authority for the statement that Mr. Harris was evidently drowned as much water was found in his lungs and body, while Mr. Hill probably died of school no water having been found in his lungs, and it was known he had a weak heart. While the manner of death may never be positively known one thing is certain, that the village of Alberton was overwhelmed with sorrow over the untimely and tragic death of two young men, who during their short residence there had endeared themselves to the whole community. They were both exemplary young men just setting out as ministers of the Gospel and helpers of humanity.  
 Heartfelt sympathy is extended to the bereaved homes, the widowed mother of Mr. Hill and to the far away family of Mr. Harris. In this sympathy the Guardian respectfully joins.  
 The bodies were forwarded to their homes yesterday morning.
