Two Hundred Take Advantage Of Bargain Trip
MONCTON, N. B., Mar. 30—Over two hundred took advantage of the special bargain trip operated by the Canadian National Railway from the Maritime Provinces to Toronto today, the first of the popular series of low priced excursions to be operated from the Maritimes beyond Montreal. The greater number are going to see the game between the Moncton Hawks and Niagara Cataracts tomorrow (Friday) night to decide who will meet the western division in the finals for the Allan Cup, representative of the Senior Amateur Hockey Championship of Canada. The number were divided about evenly between men and women and the talk was mostly hockey, post mortems being held on the first game last night between the Moncton Hawks and the Niagara Cataracts. Tomorrow (Friday) another of these low priced excursions will be operated from the Maritimes to Quebec, Montreal and Ottawa and it is expected that a large number will go on this excursion, the greater majority to Montreal.

OTTAWA, March 30—Recommending the appointment of a Senate Committee to study the livestock industry of Canada and the export trade in livestock, Hon. D. C. Riley today in the Senate Chamber discussed the serious situation now facing that industry.

The keeping of flocks and herds was the most ancient industry known to mankind and the cattle men had been the pioneers of Western Canada. The wheat growers in the nineties began to displace the cattle men and drive them towards the foothills but cattle raising still remained the most important branch of agriculture.

In 1931 Canada produced 304,000,000 bushels of wheat, which at 35 cents per bushel brought \$115,520,000. There were in the same period 600,000 cattle marketed through the stockyards and 900,000 country kill, the total value being \$60,000,000. Dairy products yielded \$238,000,000, so that the cattle and cattle products yielded \$218,000,000, more than twice the value of the wheat production.

FEDERAL HOUSE CONSIDERS BILL RE R.C.M.P.
(Canadian Press)
OTTAWA, March 30—A resolution concerning the Royal Canadian Mounted Police came up for consideration in the House of Commons today.
Sponsored by Hon. Hugh Guthrie, Minister of Justice, the resolution reads: "That it is expedient to amend the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Act to provide that money paid by the provinces for services of the force may be utilized for its maintenance; and for the disposition of moneys earned by any member of the force over and above his regular salary, pay and allowances; and to authorize the Governor in Council to determine by regulation the amount of allowance for pension purposes; and to make further provision respecting the counting of services in South Africa by officers and constables for the purposes of pension."
After some discussion the resolution was passed and a Bill based on it given first reading.
Answering a question from Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King, Liberal Leader, Mr. Guthrie stated that one purpose of the Bill which would be introduced, based on the resolution was to authorize the use of money paid by provinces to the Dominion for the maintenance of the police.
OTTAWA, March 30.—Without discussion the Government Bill lightening up the law in respect to carrying revolvers, pistols and sawed-off shot-guns, passed the final stages in the House of Commons today.
In order to meet suggestions offered during yesterday's extended discussion of the measure, Hon. Hugh Guthrie, Minister of Justice, brought in an amendment under which it becomes an offense to conceal a weapon of the kinds mentioned in a motor car. This amendment passed.
Answering E. R. E. Chevrier, (Lib., Ottawa), Mr. Guthrie stated that the amendments before the House had no bearing on the man who went out hunting carrying a rifle or shotgun.
