LONDON, Dec. 23.—Last Wednesday the Turks made a sortie from Scutari, burned villages and crossed the Servian zone and fought an all day battle with the Servians. The Turks were routed.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 23.—Severe fighting before Janina is reported. Reinforcements came to the Turks Sunday and the Greeks were driven

back. Djavid Pasha commander of the Turks Seventh army and his chief of staff were killed. The losses on both sides were heavy.

CONFIDENCE MEN UNDER ARREST

NEW YORK, N. Y., Dec. 20.—On a federal indictment charging fraudulent use of the mails in promoting stock for a mill where linen was supposed to be made in a day, six men complaining witnesses

were arrested in a raid conducted by Post Office inspectors at the office of the Sterling Debenture Company here to-day. The authorities estimated that the yearly income of the promoters in this and other ventures had been more than \$1,000,000, and that nearly \$10,000,000 of the public money had been paid over to them since they began doing business. Investors in many parts of the country are named in the indictment.
