ture until Douglas Macdonald was returned at a Cape Breton Centre by-election in 1936.

C. C. F. Surprise
Making its first general election attempt to gain representation in the House, the young party provided one of the surprises of the contest. It elected half of the six candidates it entered.

Macdonald was re-endorsed in Cape Breton Centre and, in addition to Brodie's defeat of the Miles Minister, Don Macdonald, manager of a co-operative store, was sent into office in Cape Breton South.

Here, one of the losers in a three-cornered contest was Capt. George Morrison of the active army, who had ousted from office Opposition leader Gordon S. Harrington, former premier, in 1937.

In two other Cape Breton ridings in Halifax North, the C. C. F. candidates bowed to Liberals.

For the 69 year old premier, it was his first victory at the head of the party in a general election. Though a cabinet member since 1933, he became head of the government only last year when Premier Angus L. Macdonald went to Ottawa as Navy Minister.

Likewise, Opposition leader Fraser was making his first bid for power at the head of the Conservatives. He took over the leadership just a year ago, and had sat through only one session of the Legislature.

For his brief term in the House, the Conservative chief was elected for Cumberland by acclamation at a by-election last fall. In the previous general election, he had been defeated personally by the present Premier in Hants.

Mr. Fraser's group found all its support on the mainland of the province with Cape Breton Island's eight seats going to the government and the C. C. F.

The Conservatives were elected in Colchester, Cumberland and Pictou, all double ridings. F. M. Elmsdale, George S. Dickie, members of the last House, carried the traditionally Conservative Colchester riding again without difficulty.

Ernest G. Irish, a Pictou wholesaler, managed to gain one of the seats in Pictou, both of which went to the government four years ago.

Attorney-General J. H. MacQuarrie held the other, leading Irish by a scant four votes.

It was here that the Conservatives made their only gain from the Liberals. N. G. Munro, Liberal member of the last House, was defeated with W. T. Hayden, Conservative.

Besides the attorney-general, the other cabinet members were elected as follows:

Hon. W. Willie Comeau, minister without portfolio, in Digby; industry minister Harold Connolly; Halifax north; highways minister J. D. McKenzie, Annapolis; agriculture minister J. A. McDonald, Kings; health minister F. R. Davis, Lunenburg. Hon. Gordon Romkey, speaker of the last Legislature, also was returned in Lunenburg.

All the re-elected members of the government were accorded comfortable margins. Mr. McKenzie's election was conceded 50 minutes after the close of the polls as he defeated Hanson Dowell, Conservative, a prominent sportsman.

The return of Mr. Connolly, the Premier and Mr. Comeau followed soon after. From then on, the Liberal landslide rolled at such a swift rate that the Canadian Press was enabled to flash the re-election of the government at 7:57 p. m. AST, three minutes less than two hours from the close of the polls.

A Few Close Contests
Most of the wins were decisive, but there were a few close ones, indicating possible recounts. Narrowest margin on the basis of tonight's unofficial returns, showed a tie in Queens, where the count stood Harry D. Madden, Liberal, with 2,457 against 2,436 for J. J. Cameron, Conservative member of the last House.

In Shelburne, W. T. Dauphinee, Liberal, had 2,415 to the 2,340 for Fred W. Bower, Conservative. The seat was held previously by H. R. L. Bill, Liberal, who retired.

Another close fight was in Richmond, where Liberal D. D. Boyd

N. S. Premier Gives statement

HALIFAX, Oct. 28—(CP)—The following statement was issued by Premier A. S. MacMillan tonight following his victory in the Nova Scotia general election.

I am naturally pleased with the result of the polling in the various constituencies of the province today. This result generally speaking, is as anticipated. There never was any doubt in my mind as to what the people of Nova Scotia would say regarding the administration of the affairs of the province during the last eight years.

The electorate of this province have again spoken in no uncertain way, and the present government has received a fresh mandate and are placed in a position where they felt they have the confidence of the great majority of the people of this province and their support in dealing with the complex problems that are bound to arise.

As far as the war is concerned you may rest assured that nothing will be left undone that it is possible for the government to undertake to further the efforts of the allied cause. The attitude of the government is too well known in this respect to make any further comment necessary.

I feel very keenly the loss the province has sustained through the defeat of three of the former members of the legislature, Mr. Munroe of Pictou, Capt. Morrison of Sydney and particularly the defeat of Hon. L. D. Currie, minister of mines and labor, who was a great friend of labor and who was diligent at all times in their interests. His defeat is an outstanding loss, not only to labor, but to the government of this province.

I am deeply grateful to the people of Hants County for the support given to me personally, and hope that I may merit their continued evidence of confidence.

May I express my gratification not only for myself but for the government at the support accorded to the Liberal candidates in this province.

Elmsdale School has re-opened after the fall holidays and teachers and pupils are back to work.

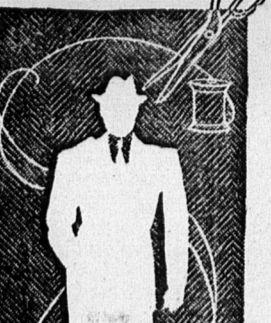

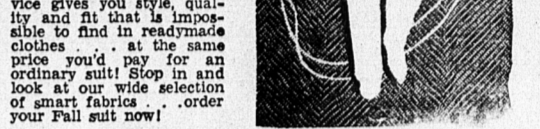

No comment From Fraser

AMHERST, N. S., Oct. 28—(CP)—Conservative Leader L. W. Fraser said tonight he would not comment until tomorrow on the results of the Nova Scotia general election.

The voting took from him the Cumberland County seat he was given by acclamation last year and returned only four Conservatives to the 30-seat legislature. Mr. Fraser said he would be in Halifax tomorrow after spending election day here.
