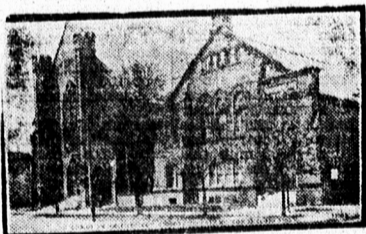

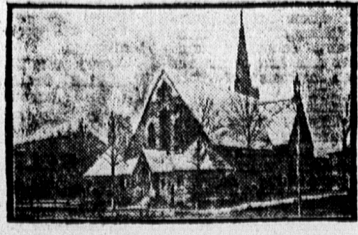

S. P. C. A. Weekly Column

Since July 1937, Mr. Henry McLean, M. Edward Road has been Inspector of the S. P. C. A. for Charlottetown, and, except for the maintaining of a car, used in an official capacity, which responsibility the Society assumes, is giving his services freely. Mr. McLean has given all of his time to S. P. C. A. work, and during the shipping season, this often necessitated his spending the better part of the night at the water front, inspecting animals, and seeing to it, that they were comfortably disposed for the long voyage to Newfoundland or St. Pierre. This service is definitely an asset to the Island and to shippers of livestock especially, as the arrival of animals at their destination, in better condition (and this fact has been acknowledged by officials at Newfoundland) with less loss caused by overcrowding and being trampled, must raise the standard of stock being shipped at the port of Charlottetown. The Society has endeavored to improve the stock, but much of the effect of his efforts may be lost, by careless handling and ill feeding during a voyage.

Liquor Cases Dismissed in Police Court

Eight Prohibition cases were dismissed in Police Court by Stipendiary Magistrate K. M. Martin, K. C., yesterday. Charges were laid following activities of four special investigators.

His Honour Stipendiary Magistrate Martin delivered the following judgment: "The evidence for the prosecution in all these cases has been confined wholly to the testimony of several persons especially employed to provoke or induce the alleged offence in order that evidence of it might be obtained, known to the law as 'agents provocateurs'. No corroboration has been offered except mutually and among them.

"Such evidence is necessarily to be regarded as essentially unsafe, and therefore not to be relied on. Factors, probably not previously disclosed either in earlier prosecution or to the law enforcement agencies, have become very apparent. Unfortunately (because belief could probably be accorded the bare evidence indicating guilt in almost all the cases, if one were enabled to ignore or allocate the indicated possibilities of error and perversion) the mass of collateral evidence, taken inter-relatedly by arrangement, discloses startling contradiction, untruth in self-protection, disregard for law and for ordinary standards of repute and behaviour. 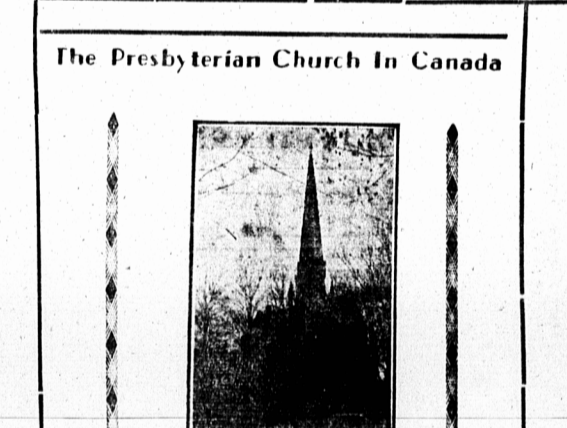
