—IN PORT.—The gasoline yacht, Irene, with Hon. Charles Dalton, Miss Dalton, Dr. Dalton, and Master Jack, Major A. A. Bartlett, Messrs. J. McCarry, B. I. Raynor and J. J. Johnson on board, which left Charlottetown Monday for Tignish, was forced to anchor off Sea Cow Head, during the storm on Monday evening. She came into Summerside yesterday morning and, after taking aboard a supply of gasoline left again about 11 o'clock.—J.

—PEEJURY CASE.—Attention has been called by Mr. McQuarrie, K. C., to the report of the King vs. Robert Coughlan, in the Guardian of yesterday as being unfair to the defendant and as containing comment on a case pending. The Guardian desires to say, in the first place, that the case is not concluded, and that the evidence given was principally by Chas. R. Burke, who Mr. McQuarrie states, had laid the information in the case, and by Mrs. Susan Gallant who, a short time ago, according to Mr. McQuarrie, had asked the defendant to go bail for her brother and was refused. The evidence of Melvin McAusland, he also states, was not positive, and as this evidence is a statement alleged to have been made by the defendant himself, it simply stands for what it is worth, as against the evidence of the defendant under oath, for which perjury is charged. The Guardian gladly withdraws the comment in the report referred to, that it was "damaging" and "most damaging" to the prisoner. The Guardian makes this correction in justice to the defendant to allay any prejudice against him which any comment in the report referred to may have, to the end that if the case should go to trial the defendant may have what he is undoubtedly entitled to, a fair trial.

—NOT DISAPPOINTED.—In the report of Dr. Hamilton's excellent address at the public meeting of the Summer School, as reported in yesterday morning's Guardian, the sentence "I have looked forward with pleasure to visiting your Island home," should have concluded with the words "and I have not been disappointed." The doctor has more than once, during his visit, expressed his pleasure at what he has seen in the Garden of the Gulf, of which he had heard very much, and his expectations, although high, have been fully realized. The regrettable typographical error in the sentence above referred to would lead the reader to infer otherwise.

LONDON, Aug. 5 (Special).—A young German was arrested in London last evening after a violent struggle, charged with attempting to obtain 150,000 by means from Lord Rothschild.

Berlin, Aug. 5 (Special).—The greater part of the second day of the court martial which is trying four lieutenants, the chief clerk and two non-commissioned officers of the Ordnance Corps, on the charge of accepting bribes for giving information of pending government contracts for arms and ammunition, was passed in hearing the testimony of a man named Brandt, once agent in Berlin of the Krupp works. The witness is being detained in prison awaiting trial before the Civil Court on a charge of bribery.


