12TH LAIRD OF GLENALADALE
Island Province Associated With History of Noted Scottish Family.

The following on the history of a family well known in this Province is from a recent Halifax exchange:

Another chapter in the history of a Scottish family settled in Canada long years ago, a story interwoven with memories of the Jacobite cause in the Old Country and the American Revolutionary War in the new, is being written in Halifax in the life of William A. Macdonald, 12th Laird of Glenaladale and Glenfinnan who lives at 16 Victoria Road.

Archibald, 10th Glenaladale, was the only one to marry and leave issue. His children are scattered far and wide. His eldest son, Frederick, the 11th Laird, died two years ago in California, and the title has now descended to William the younger brother who is the 12th Glenaladale. He has been living in Halifax for the past four years and is at present employed with the Harbor Commission.

Prominent in Athletics
William Macdonald was born at the family farm in Prince Edward Island. In his younger days he was known as one of the best all-round athletes in the Province. He took a course in dairying at Queen's, intending to stay on the land, but after his father's death he drifted away. He tried mining in the West, at Rossland, B. C., and then came back to Nova Scotia where he was employed by the Steel Company at Marble Mountain for 19 years. He has six sons and three daughters, all of whom are scattered, living in widely separated parts of the continent.

Looking back it seems to be but a brief span from the father of Captain John fighting for his "Bonnie Prince" at Culloden, to the work done now by William Macdonald with the Halifax Harbor Commission. Transient changes have come about during that time. Of the 40,000 acres at Glenaladale, not an acre remains to the family. The family is scattered far and wide and yet throughout the whole clan, traditions and ideals remain, the ideals which go back to the proud Highland forebears, the chiefdomship of whose clan is claimed, it is said, in virtue of descent from the Stuarts by their heir apparent to the British throne.

Mystery Still Surrounds N. S. Voters List
HALIFAX, Feb. 19—(C. P.)—An unidentified man delivered voters lists of unknown origin to Gerald Rogers, District One Registrar in Halifax North, he testified Saturday before the Royal Commission investigating administration of the electoral franchise act in Nova Scotia's general election on last August.

The registrar said he was a supper guest at the home of William Casey, district four registrar, when they came a knock at the door. "I guess this is it now," the witness quoted Casey as saying.

"Mr. Casey," he continued, "went to the door and came back and handed me three lists." Rogers told Mr. Justice Hugh Ross, the investigating commissioner, he did not know whence the lists had come, nor could he identify the man who had delivered them.

He had used the lists, he said though more names had been added. "In reply to a question, he declared he 'couldn't say' where 'precisely all the Jewish families in the district were kept off.'"

C. McL. Daley, K. C., member of the Conservative committee in Halifax centre, told of instructing election officials in their work. He said he "thought" the suggestion he go this had come from Russell McInnis, Conservative candidate in the centre riding, who was defeated.

The lawyer said he knew no details of Conservative organization work during the campaign, though he had been present briefly at a meeting in the party's Pentagon building, where a map of Halifax was being blocked off into districts. Since then, he said he had changed his mind regarding the legality of the divisions of the constituencies into polling districts.

WEDDED BY FATHER, IS DIVORCED BY SON
SYDNEY, Australia, Feb. 20—(C. P.)—Wedded by father and divorced by son is the story of a couple appearing in the divorce court here recently for dissolution of their marriage.

Mr. Justice Boyce, who granted the decree, observed he recognized one of the signatures on the marriage certificate. It was that of the judge's father, the late Archibald Boyce, who officiated at the marriage of the parties in St. Paul's Cathedral, London, 16 years ago.

LONDON, Feb. 19—(C. P.)—Frying license of John Rogers was suspended by the air ministry for six months after the imposition of a fine of \$500 and \$50 costs for emitting cocaine by air from Fordham.

FATALITY AT GASPAREUX
A very sad accident occurred at Gaspereux Monday which resulted in the death early Tuesday morning of Miss Ruth Reynolds, 32-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Archibald Reynolds, of that place. Miss Reynolds died of the days work she was assisting her father, who is a blacksmith, in feeding the horses for the night. While coming into the stall carrying a bucket of water she accidentally slipped and fell. The horse took fright and before help could reach her had stepped on her stomach. The doctor was immediately summoned and did all in his power to save his patient but the injured lady passed away about three o'clock Tuesday morning leaving to mourn her bereaved father and mother and one sister, Mrs. Wm. McDonald of Stellarton, N. S. Miss Reynolds, who was only past six years a valued clerk in Lower W. A. Poole & Co's store in Lower West, was highly respected and greatly beloved by relatives and friends. Her sudden death has cast a gloom over the surrounding districts and deepest sympathy goes out to the sorrowing ones.—H.

LIBRARY HOLDS COPY OF CODEX
CAPE TOWN, South Africa, Feb. 19—(C. P.)—Codex Sinaiticus, the Greek Bible which the British Government has just purchased from Soviet Russia for \$100,000 may be studied by anyone interested in a limited edition of copies was issued by the Clarendon Press, Oxford, for the benefit of libraries and universities. The copies were then destroyed so that copies are now valuable.

The photograph is extremely clear; but only a clever Greek scholar could hope to follow the manuscript as it is without the usual spacing and punctuation. It was written on fine parchment made from the skin of some large animal—possibly an antelope—and the yellowed leaves show signs of having been used more than once. It is for this reason that the British Museum authorities hope to find further records (by the use of infra-red rays) on which the visible writing has been superimposed.

Codex Sinaiticus is supposed to be the oldest Bible manuscript in Greek. The Old Testament, of course, was originally written in Hebrew; but according to certain scholars, some of the Greek translations go further back than any of the existing Hebrew manuscripts.
