37 horses are Eligible for '41 Hambletonian

GOSHEN, N.Y., Jan. 13—(AP)—Thirty-seven three-year-old colts and fillies are eligible for the 15th renewal of the \$40,000 Hambletonian which will be raced at Good Time Park in August, Will Cahagan, Secretary of the Hambletonian Society, announced today.

The 37 trotters, representing 29 owners, were kept eligible as of Jan. 1 when their owners made a payment of \$250 on each. E. Rowland Harriman, master of the Arden Homestead Farm of Goshen, has the biggest entry with 14 candidates, one more than was kept eligible by Lawrence F. Sheppard of Hanover, Pa., farm.

The winter track favorite for the check up is Harriman's Flormel, sulky driver is Harriman's Flormel, bay filly by Spencer, 1928 Hambletonian winner. Flormel's record of 2:08 1-2 won her the two-year-old trotting title last year.

Bill Gallon, son of Sandy Flash owned by R. H. Johnston of Charlotte, N.C., also is highly regarded. He trotted a mile in 2:04 last year.

Other outstanding eligibles include Lucy Hanover from Sheppard's barn who also has a record of 2:04, Aida, owned by Dr. S. W. Harrison of Union City, Ind., and Gibson Hanover, offspring of Mr. McElwain who flies the colors of M. H. Haines of York, Pa.

Bill Cowley Picks up 3 Assists in week

MONTREAL, Jan. 13—(CP)—Back in action after a week's lay-off, Boston's Bill Cowley picked up three assists during last week's National Hockey League competition, and retained his leadership in the league scoring race.

Cowley's nine goals and 21 assists for 30 points give him a two-point margin over Syl Apps of Toronto who moved into second spot by bagging three goals and as many assists. Trailing Apps by another two points was Rangers' Phil Watson, who dropped from second to third spot despite an addition of three scoring points during the week.

Bryan Hextall and Neil Colville of Rangers and Toronto's Gordie Drillon were deadlocked for fourth spot with 22 points each.

(Unofficial figures had given Hextall only 21 points, but President Frank Calder explained that Hextall had been given an assist on a goal after Rangers were defeated by Chicago last Thursday.) Hextall retained his leadership in the goal-scoring department with 14, while Cowley remained the league's leading playmaker with 21 assists.

Jimmy Orlando of Detroit remained as the league's official badman with 45 minutes in majors and minors. Pat Egan of Americans had 23 minutes, and a match misconduct, while Red Gouppie of Canadiens had 24 minutes and two 10-minute misconducts.

Toronto And Chicago Set Two All-time Records

MONTREAL, Jan. 13—(CP)—Three records—two all-time and the third a new mark for the week—were established in National Hockey League play during the week-end.

Frank Calder, League President, said today that the feat of Toronto Maple Leafs going 130 minutes without penalties in successive victories over New York Rangers and New York Americans constituted a league record.

The other all-time mark, a new attendance record, was set at Chicago during the week-end when 19,388 paid customers saw the Black Hawks defeat Detroit Red Wings 2-1.

The previous attendance record also was established at Chicago. That was Feb. 11, 1940, when Black Hawks trounced New York

Both Glace Bay's scores were made in the second period. Vic Hannebury opened by taking George Newbold's pass and firing into an open net as Goalie Legs Fraser lay sprawled after a save. Jim Dewey got the other goal, picking up a loose puck during a mix-up near Vic's net and flipping it in. Again, Fraser had no chance.

The game lacked any fireworks. The first two periods were without penalties, and the only two of the game were handed out in the last session.

Drillon makes Biggest gains In scoring race

MONTREAL, Jan. 13—(CP)—Bill Cowley, former Halifax Wolfenbute, retained his leadership among former Maritimers in the National Hockey League scoring race during the last week, but the real advance of the week went to Montreal's Gordie Drillon.

Drillon scored three goals and assisted in two others to bring his total to 22, eight less than Cowley who added three assists. Drillon moved ahead of Eddie Wiseman of Newcastle, N.B., former holder of second place, who bagged two goals during the week to bring his count to 20.

George Allen of Bayfield, N.B., retained his spot in fourth place by scoring one goal to make his total 17 on nine goals and eight assists.
