ENLISTED SERVICES OF DALHOUSIE PROFESSOR.
HALIFAX, March 9.—Dr Robert Magill, professor of philosophy at Dalhousie College, has been appointed by the government of Saskatchewan chairman of a commission to investigate the grain elevator problem of that province. The commission will consist of three members.

There are 700 or 800 elevators in Saskatchewan and the question for the commission to settle will be what change if any from the present private ownership system should be made. A proposal has been made for government ownership and operation by a commission. The commission will begin its work at the end of April and will continue for three months. Professor Magill has just finished his work as chairman of a commission appointed by the Nova Scotia government to report on an eight-hour day in provincial industries.

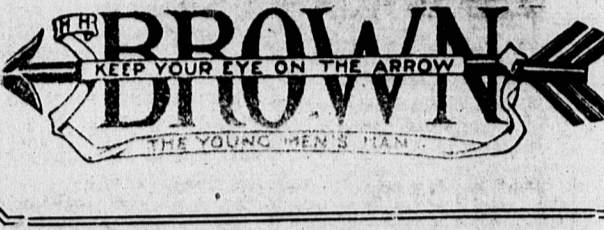
