As John Steinbeck's novel of the colorful passions of "Tortilla Flat" turned the reading public, so will the picture attract them again, and so also will it reach those who never read the book.

This screen adaptation opened at the Capitol Theatre yesterday, with Joyce Tracy, Tracy Lamarr and John Garfield co-starring. A carefully selected cast lends admirably support and the direction is what could be expected from Victor Fleming, director of "Come with the Wind" and other notable pictures.

The beauty and human understanding of Steinbeck's written words have been captured for the screen with fidelity. The laughing caricare paisanos whom he knew are all there in the flesh. Spencer Tracy is the philosophical Phil, in his most colorful characterization. Hedy Lamarr becomes the fiery Dolores, dignified beauty of the settlement, who is wooed and won by John Garfield, portraying the lazy, lovable Danny.

Frank Morgan brings his rare humor to the role of the bearded "Pirate," something of a miser out of humor, but at heart a generous and magnificent man. The Steinbeck characters are revealed faithfully, even to the five nondescript dogs which surround the "Pirate."
