Report On Irish Mutiny is Issued

(Canadian Press) DUBLIN, June 19.—The report of a committee of inquiry on the recent mutiny in the army, just issued, says the committee regards the reorganization of the Republican Brotherhood within the army as a disastrous error of judgment, and declares that Richard Mulcahy as Minister of Defence, ought to have informed the executive council of this development and of his negotiations with the group of mutineers headed by General Liam Tobin.

CHLORINE GAS RESCUE PARTY CLEARS SENATE TO WRANGEL IS.

(Canadian Press) PROVIDENCE R. I., June 19.—Long filibuster which has blocked the proceedings of the Rhode Island senate was interrupted this morning shortly after eight o'clock when a gas leak in the chamber and caused four to collapse. The incident abruptly halted session, after 42 hours without recess.

GOVT MAJORITY WIPED OUT IN SOUTH AFRICA

(Canadian Press) LONDON, June 19.—The general elections in South Africa, which Premier Smuts called because he did not command a sufficient majority in the Assembly to meet the combined attacks of Nationalists and Laborites, seem destined to bring about the fall of his administration. The latest returns to reach London indicate that the combined Nationalists and Laborites have already gained 15 seats from the Smuts party.

Fisherman Dropped Dead in Motor Boat

(Canadian Press) LUNENBERG, June 19.—Stephen Bushen, a respectable citizen of West Dublin, began his season's fishing this morning in a large motor boat. He had a fish stand and house at Cape LaHave, in which he lived during the fishing season. He had all his supplies food, clothing and bedding with him, and it is assumed that on pushing his boat off from the wharf a weak man came over him and he fell dead.

THORNTON SEES A FIGHTING CHANCE FOR THE C. G. M. M.

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, June 19.—Yesterday and today Sir Henry Thornton has appeared before the "laid off" of the countless special committees which are so numerous this year that there are hardly enough corners of the spacious Parliament building to accommodate them. Today he doubled up in adjoining rooms. Today while the special committee on Canadian National estimates and expenditures was conducting an inquiry of Sir Henry Thornton, the excited voices of members for Quebec, fighting for and against one of the Canadian National branch lines before the Senate committee floated in and almost drowned out the voice of the man most interested in those lines.

Another Victim Of Deadly Level Crossing

(Canadian Press) ST. JOHN'S, June 19.—Anslsey Wade, a farmer, married, was instantly killed today when the automobile in which he was driving was struck by the express from McAdam, according to a message received from Woodstock this afternoon. The accident took place at Bardsleys Crossing a short distance from Woodstock station.

17 Killed in Berlin Trolley Car Accident

(Canadian Press) BERLIN, June 19.—Seventeen persons were killed and 40 seriously injured last evening when a trolley car at Iserlohn hurled down hill, its brakes useless. It leaped the tracks, and crashed into the wall of a factory.

Taxi Driver Heir To English Fortune

(Canadian Press) CAMDEN, N. J., June 19.—"I don't know how much I'm going to get, but feel sure it will be no less than \$20,000," said Phillip Schoike, 28, of 703 Carmen street, Camden, as he sat in his taxicab at the Pennsylvania Railroad terminal. He said he had been informed by attorneys that his father, a theatrical producer, who died in London a fortnight ago, had left an estate of \$1,000,000. He and his mother are the sole heirs.

BRITISH LABOR GIVES SUPPORT TO SOCIALISTS

(British United Press) LONDON, June 19.—Premier MacDonald and his ministerial colleagues are charged by the anti-Government with adopting an amazingly offensive attitude toward the Mussolini Government in Italy, by at least tacit approval of a condemnatory resolution passed yesterday at a meeting of the British Labor party at which Mr. MacDonald and some of the other ministers were present.

WILL PROTECT BRIT. ARCHIVES

(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, June 19.—Requests that the United States embassy take charge of the archives of the British legation in Mexico City has been transmitted to Washington through Ambassador Kellogg and instructions forwarded to H. F. Arthur Schoenfeld, United States Charge at the Mexican capital. He was directed to inform the Mexican Foreign Office of his action as a "matter of courtesy." The Mexican government has announced its intention of not receding from its position in demanding the recall of Cummins.

SHIPS COLLIDE IN FOG OFF CAPE RACE

Both Steamers Badly Damaged But As Far As Can Be Ascertained No Lives Lost.

(Canadian Press) ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., June 19.—Two steamers supposed to be the Metagama and the Clara Camus which were damaged in a collision off Cape Race were sighted late today half way between Cape Race and St. John's. They were moving slowly and it was thought they could not reach their port before late tonight.

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STRIKING P. O. EMPLOYEES ENDORSE PROPOSAL FOR SETTLEMENT OF TROUBLE

Government Asked To Place Post Office Men Under Industrial Disputes Act Immediately To Settle Salary Schedule.—Men Who Have Replaced Strikers Will Be Retained If Competent.

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, June 19.—The striking post office employees this afternoon endorsed the proposal of the executive of the Canadian Federation of Postal Employees for the settlement of the strike. The proposal is that the government shall place the postal employees under the Industrial Disputes Act immediately to settle the salary schedule. In the meantime the men will accept the present salaries and all benefits ante-dating April 1st 1924. If the government accepts the proposal the strike will be ended.
