At the wedding of Miss Winifred Gormully and William Donaldson Erwin, which takes place in St. Alban's Church, Ottawa, on Wednesday afternoon the bride will be attended by Miss Pauline Lemoine as bridesmaid. Three articles dealing with the 'Larva and spat of the Canadian oyster,' and 'Supplementary observations on the development of the Canadian oyster,' written by J. Stafford, M. A., Ph. D., have been issued in pamphlet form for the benefit of the public. They cover observations over a period of years in which facts were discovered about the oyster and its growth that promise to have important results on the development of the industry in Canada and elsewhere.

The discovery that the hitherto unknown stages of the oyster-larva can be conveniently obtained by a plankton-net carries with it the possibility of a practical application of inestimable value in the culture of oysters. From the time of the early Roman Empire it has been known that oysters can sometimes be obtained on ropes, anchors, piles of wharves, stones, shells or other natural or artificial objects in the sea, and some sort of culture method has long been in use in many countries.

Constant efforts have been exerted to find a practicable, safe and sure method of catching, retaining and rearing the young spat. Through Mr. Stafford's observations and experiments he is able to state definitely that a man instructed and qualified in the method of taking plankton, and in identifying oyster-larva can tell almost to a day when is the proper time to put cultch so as to obtain an abundant and copious set of spat.

These articles by Mr. Stafford tell how he arrived at this result, and describe how to make a practical application of the knowledge acquired. He also proved while at the Pacific Biological station of Canada in Departure Bay, near Nanaimo, Vancouver Island, that the transplanted Prince Edward Island oysters have not died, as has been stated, and he gives further transplanting under the belief that the Atlantic importation has propagated enormously.

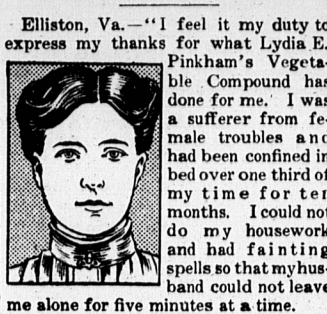
