REFORESTATION—THE SWEDISH PLAN.

The once valuable forests of Sweden having become exhausted, the Government have earnestly set about the work of reforestation. An official forester is employed with about twenty boys. The boys are placed in a line about six feet apart, each equipped with a small hand-iron. They make a small hole in the ground, drop in four or five seeds, tramp on the spot and move forward, planting from three to six feet apart. One pound of seed plants about five acres and the seed costs a shilling a pound. In this way the Swedish forests, where destroyed by fire or cut away, are replanted at a cost of about 25 cents an acre.

Mr. Louis Miller, of Grief, Scotland, who owns 100,000 acres of lumber lands in Nova Scotia, two years ago had 10,000 acres burned over. He bought a ton of spruce seed in England and is replanting the burnt land on the Swedish system. He employs about a dozen boys, with a man behind them to keep them in line. Mr. Miller reckons that a fairly good forest will contain about 6,000 feet per acre of growing trees reckoning those from the size of a man's arm and upwards. He claims that the annual growth is equal to 5 per cent. The small timber he holds to be equally valuable with the big timber because it is growing rapidly from year to year and takes the place of the big timber as the latter is cut down.

Of course, the man who plants a forest or an orchard cannot reap his harvest for years after he begins work, but if the harvest is slow in maturing it will be abundant and a well-paying crop in time. Waste lands, now entirely useless and unproductive may in this way be made of great value to future generations. It should be remembered that the first outlay in tree-planting with seed is very small. Mr. Miller says twelve boys can plant five acres a day and he hopes in twenty-five years to have a forest of merchantable pulp-wood from this year's planting. That is the way a practical lumberman looks at it.

Now, there is no part of Canada so much in need of reforestation as Prince Edward Island. There are thousands of acres of burnt and otherwise useless lands, every square yard of which might be growing trees that would "grow up with the children," and by the time the latter came to be mature men and women would be ready for the axeman's harvest. Incidentally in the meantime there would be a great advantage to the entire country in increasing and conserving the water supply in our streams and preventing drought. Surely the experiment is worth trying. Let some one set the example and it may prove contagious. Popular

interest once established in such a movement would surely induce the Provincial Government to take it up, foster and extend it, greatly to the advantage of the entire Island.

The valedictory of L. Austin Bradley at the closing exercises in St. Dunstan's was a pleasing feature among many other pleasing incidents of the day. It is clear, forcible and well phrased, and is elevated in tone and sentiment. St. Dunstan's may be proud of her graduates, and they are all deservedly proud of their Alma Mater.

An interesting movement is in progress in St. John to produce "supervised playgrounds" for the boys and girls of that city. The Women's Council have for some years urged the need of recreation grounds that would be at the same time sufficiently spacious, convenient of access, properly equipped and under such control as would secure order and decorum. In such fashion playgrounds become educative and elevating as well as health-giving. The St. John Telegraph and The Times of the same city have opened a subscription list and headed it with generous subscriptions toward this worthy object. Advocacy of a good measure thus backed up by substantial aid is doubly effective and there are good evidences that the action of The Telegraph and The Times in this matter is heartily appreciated by the best citizenship of St. John.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.
Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.
Entries must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.
The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:
(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.
(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.
Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
