LAID TO REST

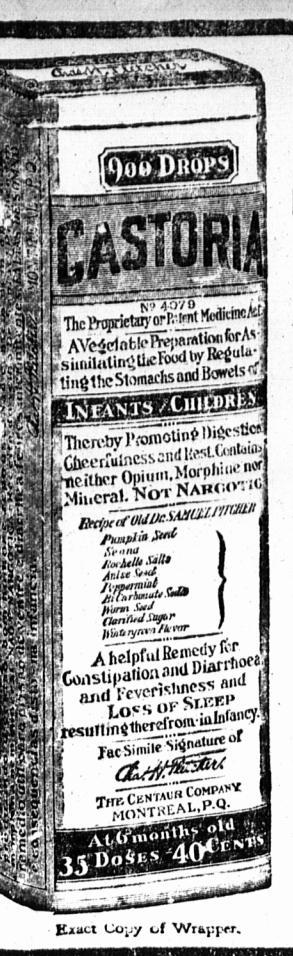
