TWO PERISH IN NIAGARA FIERE.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., March 16.—Mrs. Charlotte Patterson, 76 years old, and her daughter, Miss Elmetta Patterson, were burned to death in a fire that destroyed the Logan block here today.

Efforts by the firemen to rescue the three women failed because their ladders were a few inches too short to reach the third floor windows, where the family had been trapped by the flames. The property loss was \$15,000.

A very wide circle of friends throughout Nova Scotia will receive with real sorrow news of the sudden death, while en route from Ottawa to Springfield, Mass., his home, of George A. Huestis, youngest brother of Rev. Dr. S. F. Huestis, of Halifax, and a member of one of the best known families in this province. Mr. Huestis who was about 55 years of age and employed in the insurance business in the capacity of inspector, had for months been in an unsatisfactory state of health, an operation having, a short time ago, been found necessary. He had spent the past three months in Ottawa, having accompanied his wife to the hospital there for a time, and it was very obvious even to the most sanguine of his friends that he was very sick. Having, perhaps, a premonition that death was not far distant, he expressed a wish to return home, passing away on the train, while en route thither from Ottawa. Mr. Huestis, who was born in Wallace, N. S., is survived by his widow (who was a Miss Webster, of Petitediac), two sons and a daughter. Two brothers—Dr. S. F. Huestis, of this city and M. B.
