**Shakespearean Actor Dies in Barbados**

**BRIDGETOWN, Barbados, April 12**—(CP)—Alexander Matheson Lang, 69-year-old Montreal-born Shakespearean actor, died at his West Indies winter home here late Sunday. Lang, who made his first stage appearance in England in 1897, once played opposite Ellen Terry and toured the United States with Lily Langtry's theatrical company. In his 40-year career he played in scores of Shakespearean productions and in numerous motion pictures, several of his own production. With touring companies he trod the boards not only in Britain and the United States, but in Canada, Australia, South Africa and India as well. Lang, of whom little had been heard since he went to Barbados in 1937 to recover from pneumonia, planned to return to London this year after an absence of 10 years from Britain.

**Consider Radar Fence Around U. S., Canada**

**WASHINGTON, April 12**—(AP)—Building a truly tight radar "fence" to warn the United States and Canada of enemy air attackers is being talked. It may cost several billion dollars and require thousands of men to operate it.

These, it was learned today, are only two of many problems encountered by military and civilian experts studying the requirements for an adequate air raid warning system.

But, military leaders say, an "early warning" must be had if defensive fighter plane and ground anti-aircraft organizations are to be of value. They must be put on the alert in time to repel attack.

The estimate by some that the cost will run into billions is based on two points: (1) Radar sets are intricate and expensive; (2) many stations would be required to establish an effective screen with no loopholes.

This latter requirement arises out of the fact that radar, in its present stage, is of limited range, thus requiring numerous points to provide a continuous chain. Moreover, many of the stations must be installed in remote areas where construction and maintenance is both difficult and expensive. One such region is the Arctic rim of North America.

Although a start has been made in Alaska and Northern Canada, there now is nothing like an adequate network capable of spotting a strange aircraft coming over the Polar cap or approaching over the icy great circle courses traversing Alaska or Greenland and Eastern Canada.

The first stations of the warning system are being built by the air force in Alaska after a survey started over a year ago. Similar efforts in Canada are being carried forward as a joint Canadian-United States enterprise.

But, so far as is known, the stations in operation are few and, of more concern, far between. The range of existing radar is about 200 miles. The interval between radar stations in the far north of ten is much greater. That leaves big gaps.

The armed forces are not in complete agreement yet on the form a radar fence should take.

Some navy men have proposed a chain of radar picket ships patrol offshore, their detectors continuously scanning the skies for a possible approach by an enemy.

But some air technicians contend that the menace is from the north - meaning Russia. Weather- and ice-blocked Polar seas would preclude such picket ship patrol of the trans-Arctic air routes.

A committee appointed by Defense Secretary Forrestal and made up of both civilian and military authorities is looking into the possibility of integrating a radar warning network with the normal navigational aid system operated by air lines - radar system for landing planes in bad weather and the associated radio communication nets.
