IMPORTANT APPEAL.—The Court of appeal in Equity sits on Thursday next at the Court House, Charlottetown, for the purpose of hearing the arguments in a very important appeal. The case in question arises out of some prohibition cases which were instituted in King's county and came before Mr. Arthur F. McQuaid, the Stipendiary Magistrate of that county. An objection was taken by Mr. J. J. Johnston, K. C., to Mr. McQuaid trying the cases on the ground that he had no jurisdiction or authority to do so, and on application made to him in the matter the Vice-Chancellor, Mr. Justice Fitzgerald, upheld that contention and issued a writ of prohibition against the Magistrate, ordering him to desist from further proceeding with the cases in question. It is against the Vice-Chancellor's decision that the appeal is being brought, which is to come on next week.

S. S. MINTO.—The Minto arrived in Charlottetown about 7.35 last evening from Port Hastings, C. B. after a hard battle with ice. Capt. Read reports that the steamer succeeded in getting clear of the ice about twelve miles this side of Cape George. She picked up the schooner Iona, which left Georgetown for Canada several days ago, and brought her to a position to make her way without further difficulty back to Georgetown. The steamer had a hard job towing the Glenclife that steamer being of 50 feet beam, while the Minto is only 30 feet. As a result quite a difficulty was experienced in getting the larger craft to follow in the small opening, and a couple of the Minto's "bits" were shattered by the terrific strain. The Minto brought over a full cargo of way freight which she had aboard when ordered to go to the rescue of the Glenclife. The Minto goes to Pictou this morning to coal up after which she will return to Charlottetown to relieve the steamers of the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Company, while they are on the slip. The Minto has done excellent work this season under Capt. Read, and the travelling public in general speak in highest praise of the ship's other officers and of the cuisine, which was under the very capable supervision of Steward Scott, who did everything in his power to make the service prompt and satisfactory.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.—The Teachers Institute met on Tuesday evening in the City School Board Room. Miss Barrett, Teacher of the Kindergarten, read an interesting paper on "Dr. Montessori's Method of Education, the phenomenal success of which is attracting world-wide attention, as it is the first and only system of education worked out by a woman." Dr. Montessori's ideas, after devoting much time to the study of defective children have helped in the difficulties of the normal child, and embrace many of the principles of Froebel and other well-known educators, putting great stress on sensory training as a means to self-control and self education. Mr. Seaman then led in a most interesting discussion. Mr. R. H. Campbell, Chief Superintendent of Education, also criticized the method of Dr. Montessori. Materials used by her for sense training were shown and examined. A vote of thanks was moved and presented to Miss Barrett for her very instructive paper.
