over the last three years. The member for King's criticized P.D. Shaw, Social Credit member for Red Deer, Alberta, for devoting a considerable proportion of his speech today to conditions in the Maritime provinces.

"I don't understand," Dr. Grant said, "why a member representing a constituency in Alberta should come all the way across the country to make comments on conditions in the Maritimes."

The member for King's referred to Mr. McLure's remark earlier in the day that he almost wished that there would be a by-election in P.E. Island. "If there is," he declared, "the member for Queen's won't be able to slide on the coat-tails of another member." He criticized the Progressive Conservative member for Queen's also on grounds that the latter had referred to himself as a "commercial ambassador."

Dr. Grant said he viewed the budget with an impartial eye just as a doctor who examines a patient, maintains an open mind on the case. He felt it was a fair and an excellent review of Canada's financial situation.

Proof of Canada's prosperity he said, could be found in the fact that Canadian people had more money in the bank and more victory bonds than in any previous period of Canada's history.

constituency," Dr. Grant told the House. "The people down there are sufficiently prosperous now to pay off the mortgages they were forced to put on their farms during the regime of the Tory government from 1930 to 1935."

The member for King's also referred to the record amount of life insurance held by the people of Canada as a proof of national prosperity.

While the Liberal Government was set against socialism, he continued, it had been the pioneer in introducing social legislation into Parliament. He instanced the introduction of old age pensions, the payment of fair wages, the Farm Loans Act, the inauguration of unemployment insurance, and more recently the institution of family allowances in 1944.

He took issue with Mr. McLure on the question of unemployment and quoted an editorial published recently in the Charlottetown Guardian to the effect that far from there being unemployment in Prince Edward Island, it seemed likely that it would be necessary for the Island to import labor for many purposes.
