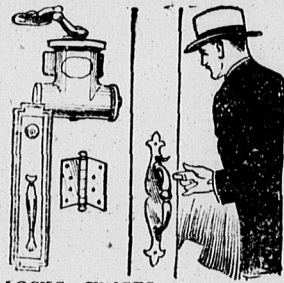

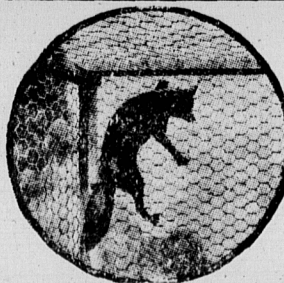

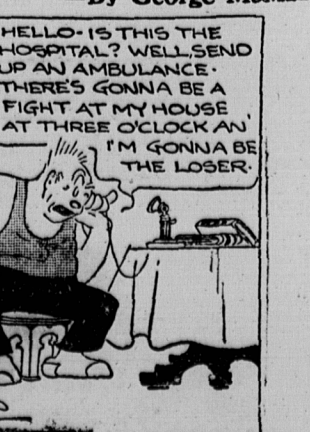

points emphasized by Mrs. Clark were that children should be taught to worship so they will have more reverence, that a hymn be sung frequently enough that the children may become familiar with it and join in the singing, that the prayer be short and simple and to have variety and simplicity in the period of worship.

Some subjects discussed were: Worship period, difficulty of getting Teachers, the importance of giving to Missions and Temperance Education. The hope was expressed that the Superintendent and Teachers of every Sunday School will do their utmost to have all the boys and girls take part in the Temperance Contest, which is to start on October 19th. The lessons this year are to be published in the regular Sunday School papers as well as in the Northern Messenger and are to extend over 6 weeks only. A resolution was unanimously passed as follows: That this Convention endorse the efforts of the Women's Christian Temperance Union and the churches in the work of Temperance Education.

At the evening session the report of the nominating committee appointed in the afternoon was given and the following officers were elected: President — Mr. John McInnis, North Winsloe. Vice-president—Mrs. Wm. Clark, Brackley. Sec'y-Treasurer—Mr. Arthur Vessey, York.

An excellent address was given by Rev. A. Gibson, who emphasized the value of the S. S. as a place for the training and development of moral character. In dealing more particularly with the teacher, he felt the teacher must be deeply religious or could not expect to mould the character of others. The Church, fathers and mothers, must stand behind the teacher, and the teacher must recognize his or her responsibility to the church and the parents for the work to be successful. Changing conditions demand changed methods and Mr. Gibson hoped, in order to get acquainted with new methods and keep up with the changes, the teachers and young people would take advantage of the Teacher Training courses provided.

During the evening music was furnished by the Winsloe Choir and a pleasing part of the programme was a solo by Rev. T. A. Wilson. A vote of thanks was extended to the people of North Winsloe for their hospitality, also to Rev. Mr. Gibson for his help and leadership throughout the Convention, to Mrs. Clark for her excellent paper and to the acting secretary.

Mr and Mrs Seymour Myers motored to Montague recently.

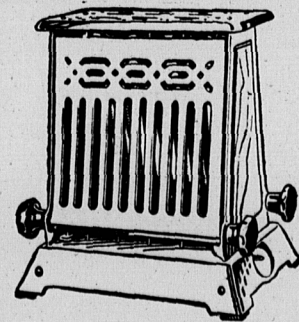
