What It Does for a Community.

IT HELPS EDUCATION

Counteracts the Saloon—Promotes Culture—Is a Great Public Good.

These noble institutions are now firmly established in almost every important town in England and America. There are associations librarians, special newspapers and quite a literature has grown up around the new progressive and philanthropic movement in favor of free public libraries. Probably the best known institution in connection with this subject is the American Library Bureau. A U. S. College Professor has sent one of their publications—The Library Primer—is a complete guide to the formation of a Free Public Library. From this work the following is selected

WHAT DOES A PUBLIC LIBRARY DO?

(1) It supplies the public with free reading. To the masses of the people—hard-worked and living hum-drum lives—the novel comes as an open door to an ideal life, in the enjoyment of which one may forget for a time the hardships, or the tedium of the real. One of the best functions of the public library is to raise this recreative reading

of the community to a higher and higher level, to replace trash with literature of a better order.

(2) A proper and worthy aim of the Public Library is the supplying of books on every profession, art of handicraft, that workers in every department who care to study may perfect themselves in their work.

(3) The Public Library helps in social and political education—in the training of citizens. It is, of course, well supplied with books and periodicals, which give the thought of the best writer on the economic and social questions now under earnest discussion.

(4) The highest and best influences of the Library may be summed up in the single word—culture. No other word so well describes the influence of the diffusion of good reading among the people in giving tone and character to their intellectual life.

(5) The free reading room connected with most of our Public Libraries and the library proper as well if it be rightly conducted is a powerful agent for counteracting the attractions of the saloons and low resorts; especially useful is it to those boys and young men who have a dominant fondness for reading and culture but lack school and home opportunities.

(6) The Library is the every ready helper of the school teacher. The Free Public Library as a part of the educational system should never be lost sight of. To the great mass of the people it comes as their first and only educational opportunity. The largest part of every man's education is that which he gives himself. It is for the individual self-administered education that the Public Library furnishes the opportunity and the means. The school starts education in childhood; libraries carry it on.

THE WRECKED ST. OLAF.

QUEBEC, July 31.—The schooner Marie Josephine has returned here from her search at Seven Islands for the remains of the ill-fated steamer St. Olaf wrecked last fall, and of the disaster. No further signs of human bodies were found than these reported some time ago; and it is not certain whether the bodies of Captain Lemaitre and the remainder of the victims have been washed out to the sea or buried by waves in drifting sand.

DUMONT COMING ACROSS.

PARIS, July 31.—Santos Dumont the aeronaut this afternoon said: "I have received several offers to give public exhibitions in the United States, but have declined them. I am considering the question of taking the balloon to America at the end of the summer however and giving practical demonstrations before American scientists."

FOUR PERSONS DROWNED.

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., August 2.—The waves from a passing steamer near Central City late last night, upset a small boat containing a pleasant party, drowning four people.
