KIND TO YOUR BUDGET... EASY TO MAKE!

Beef Upside-Down Pie

1 1/2 cups flour
3 tps. Magic Baking Powder
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. celery salt
1/2 tsp. white pepper
5 tbs. shortening

1/2 cup milk, or half milk and half water
1/2 cup sliced onion
1 can condensed tomato soup
1/2 lb. ground raw beef

Sift together flour, baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, celery salt and pepper; add 3 tablespoons shortening and mix thoroughly with fork. Add milk and stir until blended. Mix remaining two tablespoons shortening in 1/2 frying pan, and cook onions until soft. Add tomato soup, remaining 1/2 teaspoon salt and ground meat; bring to boil. Spread baking powder mixture on top of meat mixture and bake in hot oven at 475° F. for about 20 minutes. Turn out upside down on large plate. Serves 6.
