

When a person from Bedouque, Sea Cow Head, Sealpoint, Carleton, Cape Traverse, or any southern point wishes to come by this shorter way either to Summerside or west, it is necessary to either leave his team near the wharf or have some one return home with it and come back again for him. Does he want to take a load of produce to Summerside he must drive around a long road. The tourist or pleasure seeker is put to a like disadvantage. Were a proper ferry boat placed on the route the traffic would undoubtedly increase and likewise would the trade of Summerside and Bedouque develop. This section of the Province is entitled to a proper ferry, and there is little doubt but that the present subsidy would suffice under improved conditions.
