THE NEW HOCKEY RULES

The following are a few interesting rules as played by the Canadian Amateur-Hockey Association and adopted this winter by the Maritime body:

CHANGE OF PLAYERS: A change of players may be made at any time by the substitute or substitutes reporting to the referee when that official has stopped the play, but they must not get on the ice while play is in progress; such substitute or substitutes must be all ready to play for whom the substitution is made.

KNOCKING-ON: The puck may be stopped with the hand but not carried or held or knocked on by any part of the body. A player must not throw the puck or shove it along the ice with his hand or kick it deliberately.

CHARGING, TRIPPING, ETC.: No player shall raise his stick above his shoulder or throw it along the ice. Charging, tripping, collaring, kicking, chest-checking, pushing, lying, sitting or kneeling on the ice, shall not be allowed.

FAIR BODY CHECK DEFINED: A fair body check shall be when a player bodies an opponent with the hip or side of the body when standing still or skating at a slow rate of speed.
