WOLVERINES NOW LEADING PLAYOFF SERIES

Halifax Team Get Early Lead In Fast Close Game

Young Harry Currie Accounts For Only Ch'town Goal. Abbies Have Big Edge On Team Play.

(C. F. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Feb. 13—Jack Conn's Halifax Wolverines, battling for a berth in the Allan Cup playdowns, stood within one game of the championship of the Maritime Hockey League tonight after defeating Charlottetown Abbeys 3-1 in the 5th game of the best three out of five series. Wolverines have won two games and Abbeys one. Two were tied.

Chumme Lawlor, with a goal and an assist, lead the determined Wolverine attack, while Ron Hudson, who scored for Halifax in three preceding play-off games, grabbed another one tonight, the last of the game. Reggie Shields netted the second Wolverine goal, soon after Harry Currie had snapped in the only Charlottetown tally.

The game was fast and clean throughout. Referee Buz McLeod of Moncton and Cy Taylor of Dorchester, N. B., watching all rough work in the bud before any ill-feeling could be worked up by the players. Both teams were disorganized most of the time and individual plays were the feature especially as far as the Wolverines were concerned. As far as team-work was concerned the Abbies stood far ahead of the Halifax team and executed many smart plays which fell just short of beating brilliant Daddy Bubar in the Halifax cage.

Lawlor's goal, scored just a few seconds more than a minute after the game started, caught Sargent completely by surprise. It was a high backhand shot near the blue line on right wing. It went at such an angle that it crossed in front of Sargent and hit the opposite corner of the net just before the goalie sprawled in a bewildered fashion.

Excellent stick-handling by Frank Currie and the failure of Vernon Ferguson to clear a rebound, paved the way for fast-skating Harry Currie to check up the Charlottetown's lone tally. Frank wedged through the entire Halifax team two minutes after the beginning of the second period had begun and just after Graham had taken a penalty for checking Steele to the boards. He got right in on Bubar, but his shot hit the goal post and rebounded out front. Instead of clearing the puck, Ferguson tried to check Harry Currie out of play, but the shifty little winger eluded him and slid the puck into an open net.

With only 25 seconds of play left in the middle session, Everett Porteous paved the way for Halifax's winning goal when he skated in close and passed to Lawlor on left wing after he had become surrounded by players. The rebound of Lawlor's shot was picked up by Reggie Shields and shipped underneath Sargent.

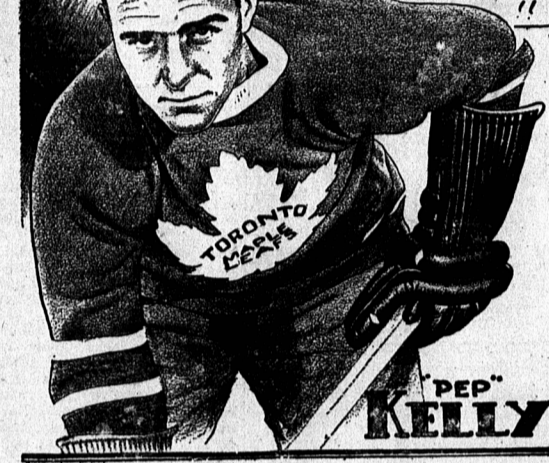
The prettiest play of the night put the game in the bag for the Wolverines after five minutes of the third period had slipped by. Owen Lennon picked up a loose puck in a corner after MacGlashen had carried it into Abbies' territory. As Lennon skated in from the corner, he suddenly passed to Hudson who was standing at the goal mouth and the speedy right winger had little trouble slipping it in.

Along The Sidelines

WOLVERINES, AS A RESULT of their victory last night, today occupy the driver's seat in the race for the Maritime "Big Three" hockey title but it was only after a mighty stiff battle from the Island crew that they attained their position. Abbeys lost nothing by their defeat, in fact they gained the commendation of Halifax writers by their smart combination efforts, a phase of the game in which they widely outlasted the winners. PRIMROSES DEFEAT ABBIES 3-1

Fine Work of Doris Rodd, Abbie Goalie, Is Feature of Play.

Playing a wide open, spectacular game, the Primroses of Summerside turned back the fast skating Abbeys by a score of one goal in the opening game of the Ladies' Island Hockey series. Only the stellar netminding of the visiting goalie Doris Rodd, kept the locals from piling up a high score. Dot Harris in the Primrose nets, only had two shots to turn aside during the game. Zilpha Linkletter, Irene Silliphant, and Margaret Gallant collected the locals' well earned markers, while the lone Abbie counter came when Ella Gay lost control of the puck when rounding her own ice. The puck rolled just inside the post before Dot Harris realized anything was wrong.
