

Curran and Briggs Wins Both Ends Of Twin Bill From St. Joseph's Team

Maxim Takes Decision From Gus Lesnevich

CINCINNATI, May 24—(AP)—Sharp-shooting, Joey Maxim of Cleveland Monday left-jabbed his way to recognition by the National Boxing Association as American light heavyweight champion with an unanimous 15-round decision over Gus Lesnevich of Clifftide, N. J.

Lesnevich, who weighed 174 3/4, led during the early rounds but never could catch up with the 174-pound Maxim after the Clevelander started throwing that lightning-left.

The real losers of the fight, however, were promoters Sam and Ben Becker. There was a disappointing crowd of only 6,931 on hand in the new Cincinnati Garden. The gross gate was \$36,151 and the backers had guaranteed Lesnevich \$30,000 and Maxim \$15,000.

The Associated Press scorecard gave Maxim eight rounds with five going to Lesnevich and two being scored as even.

CINCINNATI, May 24—(AP)—Joe Vella, manager of Gus Lesnevich, announced today that Lesnevich definitely is through with boxing in the light heavyweight ranks.

Vella said Lesnevich will devote all his efforts to heavyweight boxing and will "take on anybody at that weight—Ezzard Charles, Joe Walcott or even (Joey) Maxim—if Maxim will meet him in an over-weight go, which I doubt."

SPORTING NEWS



Despite the fact that the weather was not up to par for outdoor sporting enthusiasts, nevertheless most of the sporting events scheduled over the Victoria Day holiday were run off on schedule and met with much success regardless of the unsettled weather.

Although the ball game between the Abegweits and Summerside R.C.A.F. had to be postponed because of the wet condition of Memorial Field, the rest of the scheduled program sponsored by the Department of Physical Fitness and the Charlottetown Playground Commission was carried out successfully.

Large crowds of spectators gathered round the finishing point at the Charlottetown Armouries to see the winners come in at the end of the six-mile road race and the ten-mile bicycle race, which provided plenty of keen competition for the various entries.

Although the weather was definitely not in favor with the participants, they still made a particularly good showing, with John Paul of Wentworth, N.S. travelling the six-mile course in the good time of thirty-four minutes and two seconds, while in the bicycle race young Harold Lee of Queen Square School pushed his bike over the ten-mile route in thirty-five minutes and fifty-five seconds.

The Skeet Shooting championships were also carried out with much success, with 26 contestants weathering the cold, breezy elements on the Tea Hill site to turn in some really smart feats of marksmanship and roll up some good scores despite the unfavorable shooting conditions.

Enthusiasts of two phases of sporting activity who took a bit of a beating as far as participating in their favourite pastime was concerned were the golfers and tennis enthusiasts. Although a few did turn out on the Belvedere links to take part in the sweepstakes matches being held there, the turnout wasn't anything like what it might have been had not old man weather intervened with cold rain winds and left the greens and fairways in a wet, soft condition.

Although the Charlottetown Tennis Club had planned on yesterday as being the opening day to launch their season on its way, the heavy rain on Monday made it impossible to mark the courts out properly and, adding to the noise too dry texture of the playing surfaces, completely killed any chances of play during yesterday, and caused the postponement of the opening to a later date. The Holy Name and Holy Redeemer Clubs suffered the same fate, and just had to be content to let their tennis activities wane for the time being.

The ardent 24th of May anglers didn't seem to be out in such numbers as on previous years either, and although some did have the elements for a while, most of them were seen on the homeward trend fairly early in the day, not looking too happy over the situation. And although some might have landed a few big ones throughout the day, it is a safe bet that they were just as cold as the proverbial "cold fish" they were angling for.

In the Class "D" shoot (intermediate), Percival Simmons captured first place with a score of 31 out of a possible 50, with Ralph Jenkins running him a close second, with 30. Sydney Green, Jr., placed third with 25.

John Paul Wins Road Race; Harold Lee Cops Boys Bicycle Race

Yesterday's 24th of May sporting program, sponsored by the Department of Physical Fitness and the Charlottetown Playground Commission, went over with great success despite the cold, unsettled weather and, with the exception of the cancellation of the baseball game between Abbies and Summerside R.C.A.F. due to the unfit playing condition of the field, the events were run off successfully.

John Paul, formerly of Rocky Point and now of Wentworth, N.S., won the six-mile open running race, completing the course in 34 minutes and two seconds, leading the field by a good 200 yard margin. George Gallant of Shediac, N.B., took second place in a thrilling finish with Harold Sample of Charlottetown who placed third. Stampel was leading Gallant by a few strides about 100 yards from the finish when the Mainland runner put on a burst of speed to beat out the local boy by a couple of yards. Their times were 34:42 and 34:44 respectively.

With eight entries in the race, beginning at Winsloe, Paul led the field all the way, holding about a 50-yard advantage at the halfway mark with Stampel, Jack Hennessey of Charlottetown and Gallant following in that order. They were still running in those same positions at the corner of Elm Avenue in St. John's, but Paul increased his lead to about 300 yards on the last leg of the race out Brighton Road and around Victoria Park. Hennessey, who had been running in third place all through the race, was forced to drop out with a charley-horse while making the circuit of Victoria Park and was the only runner that didn't complete the course.

Harold Lee of Queen Square led the field of six in the ten-mile bicycle race to come home a winner in 35 minutes and 55 seconds, followed closely by Noel MacMillan and Arnold Mullins who paced second and third respectively with times of 36:50 and 37:00.

The large throngs of people who were lined along the finish routes to witness the race were forced to heavy traffic of cars back and forth, were kept well under control at all times by the efficient work of both the City Police and the P.E.I. Constabulary.

The first, second and third place winners in both events were all presented with beautiful trophies during the mammoth dance which was held at the armouries last night. Councilor W. H. Beaton made the presentations.
