**Mrs. Durkee and Children Arrive at Digby, N. S.**

DIGBY, N. S. Jan. 16.—Mrs. Sarah Durkee and her two children, Lillian, aged 10, and Churchill, aged 8, who were kidnapped from the Nashua Protestant Orphanage in Nashua, N. H. last Friday, were included among the passengers landing here today from the St. John, N. B. boat. Massachusetts and New Hampshire police have been searching the country for Mrs. Durkee and children. Although descriptions of Mrs. Durkee, said to have been suspected by her husband, from whom she is

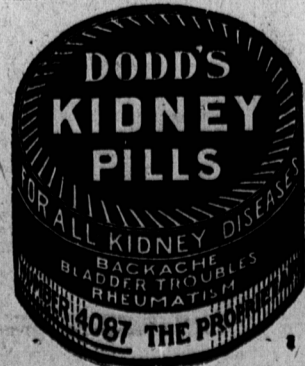
separated as being responsible for the kidnapping, were broadcast and authorities were notified that the missing woman would probably try to return to Digby, her former home, Mrs. Durkee, apparently left the United States with her children Tuesday morning undetected, passed safely through the immigration and customs and arrived in St. John last night, she took the boat to Digby this morning.

### TOUCH THAT STOPS DECAY

(By British United Press)

PARIS, January 16.—A curious experiment is now in progress at the School of Psychology in Paris, with a view to testing the claim of one Joany Gaillard, of Lyons, that by emanations from his body of some magnetic power he can arrest all forms of decay and kill microbes by the simple touch of his hands.

The eminent medico-legal expert, Dr. Locard, who has inspected pieces of meat and vegetables "mummified" by Gaillard, has expressed an inclination to believe in the man's claim. The test now in progress will probably be accepted as conclusive, for it is being controlled by H. Konig-Abert, chief of the municipal laboratories, five eminent doctors and two



lawyers. Two meat safes have been installed in the School of Psychology, in each of which was placed under seal a slice of liver, a mutton chop, a fish and an orange. For ten days Gaillard will touch objects in one of the safes twice a day, and they will then be replaced under seal, while the contents of the other safe will be left untouched, so as to decay in the ordinary way. Should Gaillard's claim prove well founded, the objects in the other safe, which he will have handled for about forty minutes each day, should simply dry up into mummified condition.

### Monogram Taken off Mail Wagons

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 16.—Why His Majesty's monogram "G. R." has been taken of some mail wagons was the subject of a rather abortive query in the post office department today. The change is not recent nor under the present postmaster general, nor is it general. Many of the wagons in use in Ottawa, carry the monogram while some bear the words "Canada mail," and some both devices.

To the extent that the change has been made it appears to have been done under the regime of the former Postmaster General Hon. Chas. Murphy or at least that is the intimation. As to the substitution of Canada Mail for His Majesty's mail in the revised statutes, it was explained that the old post office act the two terms were used indiscriminately and confusion is said to have resulted. To overcome this "Canada Mail" was adopted as the more specific. The suggestion was made by the department and put into the revision which was ratified by parliament.

### Ancient Hebrew Rites in 1928

LONDON, January 11.—Many people have been surprised to learn that "chaltza"—the ancient Jewish custom which demands that a childless widow shall secure release from the obligation of marriage with one of her husband's brothers—still prevails among orthodox Jews.

Discussing the custom, Rabbi L. I. Mattuck, of the Liberal Jewish Synagogue, said that in ancient times a wife with no children inherited no rights from her husband, whose money returned to his family.

When the Rabbinic law was drawn up, a passage in Leviticus forbidding a widow to marry her husband's brother was seen to conflict with a passage in Deuteronomy which said that a childless widow must marry her husband's brother. It was enacted that in no circumstances might a widow marry her husband's brother, but must obtain release from the obligation.

erica or Germany." Rabbi Mattuck says. "There are no other surviving Jewish customs quite like it, but there are many existing practices which date from ancient times."

"The practice of breaking a glass at a wedding doubtless derives from the ancient belief that when human beings are happy the gods are jealous. There are several proffered explanations of the custom. Psalm 137 is quoted:—

"If I do not remember thee, let my tongue cleave to the roof of my mouth; if I prefer not Jerusalem above my chief joy. Remember, O Lord, the children of Edom in the day of Jerusalem; who said, raise it, raise it, even to the foundation thereof."

"Others see in the custom a reminder that just as the breaking of glass is irrevocable, so is the establishment of the wedding relation."

"Another primitive practice is benediction by the priests in orthodox cent from the old priestly caste stand synagogues. Those who claim descent in front of the congregation, covering themselves with prayer shawls and with hands uplifted, and pro-

nouncing the benediction from Numbers: 'The Lord bless thee and keep thee.'

"The ancient practice of keeping a perpetual light in the synagogue still persists, and in synagogues oil is still used for the light. The procession with palm branches pertaining to the Feast of Tabernacles is copied from ancient Temple days.

### More Equitable Distribution of Taxes Sought

OTTAWA, Jan. 8.—The citizen today gives prominence to the following report: "A move will shortly be made, headed by the French Canadian educational Association of the province of Ontario to secure from the provincial government a more equitable distribution to Ro-

man Catholic schools of the taxes derived from public utilities, incorporated companies, and those arising out of leases by the Dominion and provincial governments of private property."

The matter has been brought to a head by the recent conference in Ottawa, at the archbishop's palace of a number of bishops, clergy and separate schools officials from all over the province when a committee was formed to deal with the question.

"It is understood that a meeting between representatives of the French and English speaking Roman Catholic school supporters of Ontario will be called at an early date."
