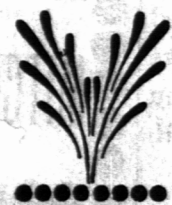

The Journal, ever ready to make capital out of Crusades, as the current sewer, is instituting a big plea or the organs, stating the innocent delight furnished the myriad children of the tenements who have no other delight in their poor parched lives and it is true. It is only a few dyspeptic people troubled with nerves, who object to the organs. Nearly everybody finds a certain pleasure in the pretty airs doled out within their hearing all day long, ranging from "The Palms," and "It is Well It is Well with my Soul" to "Ragtime Liz" and "I won't be Your Lady Fren' No More." And if the organs were abolished New York would be shorn of one quite most picturesque display. Of all the charming and wonderful sights of the great city none is more innocently delightful than to see the group of little girls, some ragged, all unwashed, but all their faces suffused with joy, tripping their nimble feet to the organ-grinders' airs. The organ-grinder must not "go."

THE HEAT AND CONEY.

Midsummer has descended on the city with its mercury "mounting higher and higher" like the flames in the old Fourth Reader and its manifold phases of suffering and recreation. For two weeks the heat remained at high pressure, killing hundreds, but there has been a respite in the past few days most gratefully received. All the seashore resorts are crowded to capacity and never was so many excursion trips possible out of New York particularly on Sunday, when the city is practically deserted. Coney Island gets 150,000 regularly every Sunday, including its ownest own 30,000 people, which makes quite a scene by the sobbing sea billows. Bathing at Coney is one of the great features, now that Neptune has tormented his breakers, and of a warm Sunday afternoon thousands go to the surf there, making a scene unequalled in animation and variety probably anywhere else in the world. But the awful discomfort of transit facilities makes the ride to and from Coney a nightmare. It is a sight to make the gentleman from Squashtown Corners, Ughosh, stare to stand at the Brooklyn Bridge terminus of the Coney cars and see the sea of scrambling, maddened humanity that rolls there on a Sunday afternoon and evening. Cars designed to carry 80 people are freighted with twice that number and the popular expression regarding a ride to Coney is that you "hang on by your eyelash." There is a steamboat service to Coney from the Battery, however, which makes perhaps the most delightful sail the world has to offer and the people who patronize it are distinctly more agreeable than those who take the 1 cent ride through the fens of Long Island. But these also have their reward.
