**Canada Believes Depression Ending**

OTTAWA, Nov. 23.—There are many reasons, and in the opinion of experts there is considerable justification for the wave of optimism which has spread over Canada in recent weeks and for the development of confidence that so far as this country is concerned the depression has seen its worst days.

The improvement in wheat prices and prospects meant many millions of dollars to producers and brightened many lines of business. Other important interests benefitted equally by the advance in silver. Retail trade has made gains, car loadings are out of the depths, wholesale prices show improvement, mine production is higher, factories are reopening or operating on a higher scale, newspaper production is better, building construction is gaining. There is a general impression that the tide has turned.

There will be no cessation this winter, however, in the efforts of the Federal Government in association with provincial and municipal authorities to assure work for every able-bodied Canadian, or direct relief if useful labor cannot be provided. It is estimated that the cost of such measures to the Federal Treasury will be not less than \$10,000,000, and a domestic loan is being issued to finance it, the unfavorable exchange rate on the Canadian dollar in the United States practically having closed the New York market for new financing.

The Government is advancing about \$1,000,000 for the relief of an area in southern Saskatchewan where crops were destroyed by drought, and it is a notable expression of confidence in the immediate future of that great wheat-producing province that in most cases farmers have insisted upon the relief being in the nature of a loan repayable at a convenient date. In

recent weeks this area has had heavy rains and the soil is in excellent condition for next year's crops.

**Rural Children Educated By Mail**

REGINA, Nov. 21.—Ten thousand persons in the province of Saskatchewan, most of them children but including many adults as well, are receiving an education by mail from the Government, according to the announcement of Mr. J. T. M. Anderson, Premier of the Province, who also is Minister of Education. To lessons given by printed instruction have been added recently a series of half-hour radio talks five days a week.

The correspondence course was organized in 1925 to reach sparsely settled districts in the province and its success has been gratifying. Today those enrolled include children whose homes are outside the organized school districts, crippled and ailing children, adults anxious to obtain the rudiments of an education but prevented by their age from attending grade schools, and returned soldiers whose education was interrupted by war service.

The courses for the public school grades are prepared by professional teachers. There is no charge for tuition and readers are supplied free of charge to the six junior grades. Approximately 6,000 students are taking high school courses, some studying entirely at home and others supplementing the work of rural schools. These courses are organized by university specialists and small tuition fees are charged except in special cases. A year's work in each subject is divided into about two lessons, each requiring two weeks.

The supplementary radio broadcasts give instruction in English, French, German, Latin, History and Science, and answer questions of students and rural teachers when they are of general interest.
