CENTRAL GUARDIAN Rotarians Will Sponsor Greek War Relief Fund

Three very interesting addresses were given at yesterday's luncheon meeting of the Charlottetown Rotary Club. Rotarian T. W. L. Prowse spoke on retaining under wartime conditions, Col. G. Elliott, Full, V.D., officer commanding the 42nd Reserve Brigade, spoke on the Reserve Army recruiting campaign now in progress in this province. The Greek war relief fund and appeal was the subject of an address by Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan. The appeal for help for the Greeks is to be launched in Canada June 7th to 26th. Canada is aiming to subscribe one-half million dollars and this province's share has been set tentatively at \$5,000. The Rotary Club decided to sponsor the Greek fund in this province. Messrs. George Walters, Tom Rogers, P. W. Clarkin and N. D. MacLean were named a committee to organize the campaign here. There will be no personal canvass. Col. Full made a stirring appeal for volunteers in the city for Reserve Army units, especially for the artillery the signallers and the army service corps. Mr. Prowse in his talk stated that in view of the campaign for drastic reduction in consumer spending, it was a question whether retailers will be able to continue their large-scale contributions to the war effort of the country. Practices all over the world have been increased, he said, and many have to carry on with skeleton staffs. He urged that that might best work for the general welfare of the country as a whole, if any further effort were made to reduce civilian spending. Guests present were: Messrs. Lawrence Baird and Gerald Clark of the Montreal Standard, Rotarian Alfred Pickard presided.

I.O.D.E. is Out For Membership of 50'000 Plus

EDMONTON May 13.—(CP) Report of the Organization Committee of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire at the annual meeting here was prefaced by a plea for whole-hearted co-operation of all members in the over-widening tasks and responsibilities created by the war.

Membership by provinces showed Ontario with a paid-up membership of 14,939; Quebec 5,521; British Columbia 3,153; Nova Scotia 2,779; Alberta 2,362; Saskatchewan, 2,143; New Brunswick 1,991; Manitoba 1,553 - a total paid-up membership of 32,411 Primary Chapter members. In addition there were 1,367 junior members making a grand total of 33,878 members received among the chapters, and 28 municipal, 825 primary and 73 junior chapters.
