**GOVERNMENT APPOINTMENTS**—At a recent meeting of the Executive Council Earl Nicholson, Charlottetown was appointed Instructor in Physical Education at Prince of Wales College during the illness of Wilfred Inman. **POSTAL RELAY BOXES**—Twenty-two relay boxes for the convenience of letter carriers have been placed at opportune points throughout the City. Formerly, excess mail was merely placed at some store or house convenient to the carrier. Under the new arrangements the mail will be placed in the boxes a short time before the carrier starts on his walk and will be extracted by the postman when he sees fit. All boxes will be securely locked, and only the team depositor and the carrier will have access to it. Similar boxes have been distributed to all cities where letter carriers are stationed.

**FABRIC DESIGNS ON DISPLAY**—Folklore of the countryside and familiar flowers and plants form the basis of the hand painted drapery designs currently being shown at the Art Centre. The designs are the work of Mrs. William Hoey of Bronte, Ontario, who uses the silk screen process to transfer the designs from drawing board to fabric. Mrs. Hoey divides her busy days between looking after her two young children and creating new designs for Canadian fabrics. Featured in the display at the Art Centre is a drapery using the Lady's Slipper flower for the main motif. A photographic exhibition showing the value of good design in such things as toasters, irons, and furniture illustrates the attractive articles which may be produced by machine. On Friday evening following, the regular night class in watercolor painting, Miss Frances Johnson, director of the Art Centre, will give a talk on the work of Mrs. Hoey.

**Income Tax Notices**  
OTTAWA, February 13.—The Honourable Dr. J. J. McCann, Minister of National Revenue, announced to-day that the Taxation Division has shipped approximately 20,000,000 Income Tax Forms to District Income Tax Offices and Post Offices across Canada. The Income Tax Forms are for use of approximately 3,250,000 individuals required to file 1949 Income Tax returns.

Experience has proven that it is necessary to provide an ample supply of forms for the tax-paying public. Many taxpayers take several forms despite the fact that only one is required to be filed with the District Income Tax Office.

Only persons in receipt of a salary or pension or investment not exceeding \$2,400, may use the T-1 Short Form.

All other classes of individual taxpayers, such as doctors, lawyers, dentists, farmers, fishermen and individuals in business, are required to use the T-1 General Form.
