Already the Toronto Globe tells that the members of the Ontario Legislature are talking of increasing their sessional pay from \$600 to \$800 or \$1,000. The Globe adds, that should a bill to that effect be introduced it will meet with no prolonged or bitter opposition.

QUAINT EPITAPHS IN DORCHESTER.

A Baltimorean who has been collecting queer epitaphs from the old graveyards of the State recently made some unique additions from a cemetery on the banks of the Little Choptank in Dorchester. The cemetery is connected with a church known as the Old Trinity, and both the church and many of the graves are over 100 years old.

One of the epitaphs taken from an ancient tomb is:

THE COST OF THE WAR.

LONDON, February 23.—In the house of commons today Lord Cranborne, parliament secretary for the foreign office, assured Mr. William Redmond that the Emperor of Germany had not offered to arbitrate the question of terminating the war in South Africa.

Replying to the question on the cost of the war, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach chancellor of the exchequer said that thus far £81,500,000 of bonds had been issued, and that the weekly issue was from £1,000,000 to £1,250,000.
