A Rat-Rabbit (British United Press) LONDON, March 9.—A remarkable instance of hybridism which occurred under natural conditions in Orkney is vouched for by a Stromness correspondent to the "Orkadian."

A boy caught a rabbit alive among some large stones just above high-water mark. He was more than astonished to find that it had the long tail and the feet of a rat. The head and body were those of a rabbit, and the creature was about the size of an ordinary full-grown rabbit. The animal was seen by several highly reliable townspeople, who declared that they had never before seen such a creature. From the situation of the place where the animal was found it is clear that rabbits have little chance of travelling far, and there is even less chance of unrelated rabbits reaching the place. Consequently, no fresh blood is imparted to the stock, and inbreeding must be the rule. Rats abound on the island. This rare freak was evidently the result of inter-breeding between a rabbit and a rat. 000,000 per annum to maintain, apart from renewals. Plan To Wreck Cathedral Fails

(Special to the Guardian) VERA CRUZ, Mexico, March 9.—Authorities throughout Mexico sought today to trace two men believed responsible for the explosion of a bomb in the Jalapa Cathedral in which fifteen persons were injured and hundreds of worshippers at Mass were thrown into panic. A woman 58 years old was the most seriously hurt. She received severe injuries to the head and arms. The congregation at Mass was composed largely of women and children. The bomb was placed beneath a small altar. The explosion wrecked a section of the Cathedral wall and cracked other parts of the building. Windows were smashed and the force of the blast was felt throughout the city. Two men, who were seen entering the cathedral dressed as peasants and carrying bundles wrapped in newspapers were believed to have placed the bomb. They fled during the confusion after the explosion.

To Prohibit Sale Of Game Meat In N. B.

(Special to the Guardian) FREDERICTON, March 9.—Joint action is to be taken during the present session of the New Brunswick Legislature by the New Brunswick Game Association and the N. B. Fish and Game Protective Association for legislation absolutely to prohibit the sale of game meat. It was learned here today. For many years there were no restrictions in the sale of venison, and a few years ago the Game Association made representations which produced legislation confining the sale to those killing the game. It is understood that the Government considers the time to be now ripe for the measure, the intention of which is to conserve the supply of big game. A delegation from the Association will interview the Government with a view to having a prohibitory law passed during the present session.
