marine slip for repairs. She is not leaking  
and it is thought her injuries are slight.—  
Halifax Chronicle, 29th.

THE Baptist Church at Murray river  
has purchased an organ for use in the  
services of the church. Through the  
energy and perseverance of Miss Oia  
Jackson the entire amount has been  
collected, and the thanks of the church  
are due to her, and to the friends of all  
denominations who so kindly responded  
to her request for donations. The work  
of the church is progressing encourag-  
ingly. Miss Minetta Crandall B. A. of  
Acadia '03 who has been teaching in  
Nova Scotia the past year, has arrived  
at Murray River, and will spend the  
summer with her parents.

The Rev. John M. MacInnis M. A. L.  
who visit the Island a few days ago has re-  
ceived a unanimous call to the First Pres-  
byterian Church Montrose, Penn. This is  
the church in which Judge  
Jessup also nominated Abraham  
Lincoln for President served  
as elder for many years, and in which  
the noted missionary, Rev. Henry Jessup D.  
D., L. L. D. was baptized and ordained to  
the ministry. The church is considered  
one of the important churches in connec-  
tion with the American Presbyterian  
church and is a most desirable charge.  
When it became vacant more than 90  
names were presented to the committee  
on supply to be considered as suitable  
candidates for the pastorate of the church.  
When Mr. MacInnis was on his way to  
the Island a few weeks ago he supplied  
the church for two Sundays with the  
result that he has been extended an unan-  
imous call to become their Pastor.  
Mr. MacInnis is now supplying James  
Church, New Glasgow, Nova Scotia for  
two Sundays, and will leave for his home  
in Santa Clara, California about the 1st  
of August. He will not give his decision on  
the Montrose call until after he returns  
home. Mr. MacInnis has many friends in  
this city who will be glad to hear of his  
success. He is married to Miss Coffin of  
this city.

THE Grand River Co's steamer, Viking,  
Captain McGrigg, has returned from her  
trip to Labrador. She left Halifax on  
June 11, and proceeded to Rigoulet,  
Labrador, where she discharged her  
general cargo and landed her passengers.  
At this port she took on the body of Dr.  
Hardy, the young Prince Ed-  
ward Island physician, who died  
last February, from the results of a  
chill taken in his efforts to reach Mr.  
Wallace of the ill-fated Hubbard explor-  
ing expedition. The Viking then proceed-  
ed to Quebec where the body was landed,  
and took on a cargo of flour pork and hay,  
returning again to Rigoulet. The steamer  
met lots of ice in the Labrador coast and  
at one time was held for fourteen days.  
They went up the Grand River to Car-  
ter's Basin now called Gillisport. At the  
site of the company's operations the tem-  
perature was over 90 in spite of the  
large quantities of ice on the coast. It is  
expected that there will be a big cut at  
Grand River this season. The Viking  
brought back seven men whose term of  
service had expired. One of them a Ship  
Harbor man, had taken a wife into him-  
self while there—an Esquimaux widow—  
and, she, with her four children, came  
with him. On the voyage the boatswain  
of the ship fell overboard and was rescued  
by Charles Thompson, one of the return-  
ing lumbermen. A large number of icebergs  
were seen on the trip home.—Halifax  
Chronicle.

THE Earlham Echo, Madison Co., Iowa,  
has a very touching reference to the  
death of Mrs. Thomson, wife of J. R.  
Thompson of that place. Mr. J. R.  
Thompson is a brother of J. L. Thomson of the P. E.  
I. E. and renewed many acquaintances  
while on a visit here last summer.—  
The community was deeply shocked  
Friday morning when a message was re-  
ceived announcing the death of Mrs.  
Margaret Thomson, who was one of the  
oldest and most respected citizens of  
Earlham. While Mrs. Thomson has  
been in ill health for many years her  
sudden demise was unexpected and was  
received by her many friends with  
much surprise and profound  
sorrow. The funeral services were held  
from the family residence at 2 p. m., Sun-  
day, July 17, conducted by Rev. D. H.  
Garrett of Pitzer, Ia., after which inter-  
ment was made in Earlham cemetery  
Margaret Madden was born June 27th,  
1845, at Liverpool, England; came to Scott  
County, Iowa, in March, 1850; was mar-  
ried to J. R. Thomson Dec. 14, 1866; moved  
to Earlham, Iowa, in March, 1886. De-  
parted this life July 15, 1904, aged 59 years  
and 18 days. To mourn her loss besides  
her husband she leaves two sons, Hugh  
S. and John Charles, and their  
families; one sister, Mary J. Greer,  
Eldridge, Iowa and three brothers, W. S.  
Madden, Holton, Kan., J. G. Madden,  
Lock Grove, Ia., and G. M. Madden,  
Valley Falls, Kan. Mrs. Margaret Thomp-  
son was a true, Christian woman, a loving  
wife and fond mother. She was respect-  
ed and loved by all who made her ac-  
quaintance, and while we mourn her  
taking away, we are reminded that it is  
not all of life to live, nor all of death to  
die.
