Five drilling rigs are in active operation, between St. Joseph's College and Dover on the Petitoche River. The company has two pumping plants, and ten or twelve wells in the St. Joseph's district are being pumped, averaging two and a half barrels per day of ten hours for each well. This is a capital showing, the more especially as the oil is said to be of the very best quality.

In the Patricia oilfield in Ontario it has been found profitable to sink as many as two wells per acre of the oil territory. It will be seen at a glance that were the territory of the New Brunswick company thus developed there would follow not only an enormous number of wells, but also a production of oil such as would assume the proportions of a great national industry. 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CLOCK WITHOUT HANDS.

Several efforts have been made recently to displace the familiar form of clocks with dials, which has been in use since the days the sun dial was supplanted by this then saw method of time-telling. One of the most novel of these innovations is the Patoc clock which has a great fascination in that one may actually see the time fly. Instead of the dial there are a number of vanes secured to an upright spindle which is turned by the mechanism contained in the base of the device. Once every minute the vanes of one of the two groups are released, indicating the minute, and every hour the same operation is repeated.

This clock is operated by the same mechanism which is used in the more familiar forms, but instead of the hand's time is indicated by figures revolving on cylinders. One set of figures only is visible through windows in the case, all the others being hidden from view. The inventor claims that this is a much quicker way of ascertaining the time than with the dial. In the lower part of the case will be seen a half-circle, which is for the purpose of indicating the seconds as they roll along.

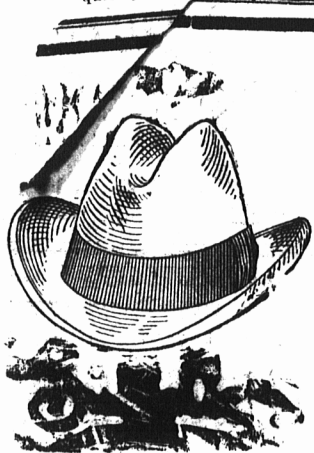
